Casper Wins "500" Open
INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Billy Casper, 1956 U.S. Open champion, fired a closing seven-under-par 64 Sunday to capture the \$50,000 "500" Festival golf open with a record-smashing total of 264. He sank a four-foot birdie putt on the 72nd hole to finish a stroke ahead of Jerry Steel and George Bayer, who almost staked a claim to the \$20,000 first prize with closing eagles.

Casper, 36, the year's second leading money winner, ran his earnings to \$41,200, still behind the 1962 pace-setter Arnold Palmer, who skipped this rain-plagued tournament on the par 71 Speedway course. Palmer has won \$59,200.

Casper's rounds of 66-67-64-64 shattered the most record of Victoria, connecting the village with a new provincial park that will be opened there this summer.
