The Burning Bark. St. Pierre, Miq., Nov. 9. The burning bark reported yesterday was the Caspar, Capt. Roberts, which left Miramichi last Friday week. The fire showed itself in the hold under the forward house on Sunday morning. The crew left in the lifeboat Sunday noon and reached Langley in 24 hours all well. The vessel was towed to St. Pierre Tuesday still burning inside. The outside was burnt to the water's edge.

Shot His Niece.

QUEBEC, Nov. 9. In the parish of St. George, Beauce County, last Wednesday evening, a number of young men got on a spree and annoyed a man named Wintle till, goaded beyond endurance, he seized a loaded gun and fired at them. The bullet missed them but lodged in the body of his niece. The girl lingered until Friday, when she expired. The district coroner then had Wintle arrested. At latest accounts the inquest was still proceeding.

Two Men Shot.

MACHIAS, Me., Nov. 9. L. D. Hill and C. Niles were both shot dead yesterday afternoon near Fletcher Bros. house, Machias River, by parties unknown. The ruffians were in a wagon well loaded with camp outfits. The murderer appeared to be 35 years old, and his companion 50. Officers Long and Pettingle are in pursuit of the murderers with a man who thinks he can identify the criminals.

Grand Jury Findings.

MONTREAL, Nov. 9. The Grand Jury of the Court of Queen's Bench to-day found a true bill against Rev. Abbe Chabest for attempted rape on a girl under 12, and no bill against Dr. Crevier, charged with using instruments on Mrs. Fanny Ward to produce a miscarriage.

A Rising Suppressed.

SOPIA, Nov. 9. Russian partisans at Slivena, headed by the recently liberated officers, made an attempt to incite a rising to-day, the authorities, who had been previously warned, suppressed the attempt and arrested the plotters.

Fire in a Mine.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 9. The fire in the Standard coal mines is still burning, and all efforts to extinguish it have failed. The stoppage of the mines throws 800 men, who earn \$40,000 a month, out of employment.

Struck a Rock.

HALIFAX, Nov. 9. The French steamer St. Pierre, running between that island and this port struck on a rock in Bras d'Or Lake this morning. Hopes are entertained that she can be floated when lightened.

Indian Contributions.

SOUTHAMPTON, Ont., Nov. 9. The Indians on the Chippewa reserve near here, contributed \$250, to be paid out of their government annuity to the white sufferers by the late fire in this village.

Committed for Perjury.

MONCTON, Nov. 9. Sitting Magistrate Smith this morning committed Geo. P. Thomas for trial at the next sitting of the County Court for perjury. Bail for \$300 was accepted.

Cruiser Ashore.

HALIFAX, Nov. 9. The Government cruiser Acadia went on shore last night six miles from St. Peter's Canal, but was floated to-day without injury.

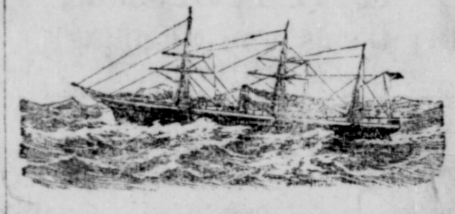
Brakeman Injured.
