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Investments Enter Canada

OTTAWA (CP) — The flow of foreign capital into Canada reached an all-time high in the first half of 1957 as overseas investors staged unprecedented demands for Canadian stocks. In the sale of new and old stocks and bonds, total net imports of capital swelled to \$553,000,000 from \$306,000,000 in the first six months of 1956, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday. About one-quarter of this total came from overseas sources, chiefly the United Kingdom. Net sales of securities to the U.K. totalled \$72,300,000 in the half-year — almost as great as the \$86,800,000 for the full year of 1956. Of the \$72,300,000 sales, \$69,000,000 were in stocks. In those six months, Canada had a net export of capital to the United States in trade of old securities. The export, amounting to \$21,700,000, resulted mainly from repurchases of outstanding Canadian bonds.

Orthodox, Roman, Catholic: Seek For Common Ground

LISLE, ILL. (AP) — Catholic scholars of Eastern and Western cultures have assembled to search for means of eventually uniting 200,000,000 Eastern Orthodox Christians with Rome. The four days of discussions and ceremonies at the Benedictine Abbey of St. Procopius here form the second Unionistic Congress conducted at the direction of Pope Pius XII. It is a revival of congresses conducted in Czechoslovakia before that country became a Communist satellite.

At the first congress in Lisle last summer the participants reported sufficient interest among both Roman Catholic and Orthodox leaders to warrant a continuance of the talks. But all agreed that years of exploration will be needed before they may hope to mend a breach which has existed for centuries.

The separation of Christians now known as Orthodox from those under the Roman holy see tending over hundreds of years, was a continuing movement extending over centuries.

Abot Ondrak has been given bi-ritual faculties by the Pope. He can perform ceremonies in the Latin rite, to which the great majority of Roman Catholics belong, or in the Byzantine rite, largest of the Eastern rit. of Catholics. Byzantine Catholics number about 9,000,000. Other millions belong to such Eastern rites as the Chaldean, Melkite, Maronite, Italo-Greek, Malabarese and others. Their ceremonies, performed in many languages, are virtually identical with those of Eastern Orthodox Christians of corresponding culture and tradition.

Orthodox, Roman, Catholic: Seek For Common Ground

It became final with a papal decree in 1054. Viewing the picture today, Abot Ambrose of Ondrak of St. Procopius said: "We know that defections from the Roman Catholic Church have quite frequently been the result of individual, political or social conflicts which had at times only a very indirect bearing on the faith." He referred to the Eastern schism which grew out of the struggle between Rome and Constantinople and some of their leaders for dominance over the world in the early centuries after Christ. "Today, for the overwhelming portion, these basically non-religious differences have ceased to exist, especially for those who have suffered together in the crucible of Godless persecution. "And so the road to unity has once again been made clear for the return of all, and in a special way... the Eastern Christians of Russia, Greece and other lands."

The bidding: South West North East 2♥ Pass 2NT Pass 3♥ Pass 3NT Pass

Opening lead—jack of diamonds. We have no quarrel with South's two bid. It strikes us as just right. In fact, we might get a little cantankerous with any partner who opened with less than a game force.

Nor do we see anything wrong with the three heart bid, since the forcing two bid carries through until game is reached. After all, if partner now bid four clubs or diamonds, we'd be willing to gamble out bidding six of partner's suit.
