

BOMBAY TRIP FOR PONTIFF

Pope Paul Reveals Plan To Attend RC Congress

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul announced Sunday that he will go to the international eucharistic congress in Bombay, India, on the longest trip any pope has ever made. His words suggested that he might make other flights as far or farther. "The Pope is becoming a missionary," said the Pontiff who broke precedent last January by a flight to the Holy Land. "But we think that, like the first journey to the Holy Land, this journey to the gates of this immense Asia, this new eucharistic congress will be the beginning of a new era in the nature of the requirements of the apostolic ministry."

Peace Key Seen In U.S. Might

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson gave assurances Sunday night the United States will stand strong and seek peace in the face of Russia's political explosion and China's nuclear blast. In a report to the nation by radio and television on what he called "an eventful week in the affairs of the world," Johnson said this world has changed many times in the last 20 years and have become good friends, and dangers have followed danger. "Through this period," Johnson said, "we have steadily moved toward a more hopeful world, we have moved toward widening freedom and more lasting peace. We will continue in this direction."

Wilson Ponders Stee Takeover

LONDON (CP)—Prime Minister Harold Wilson is considering a headfirst plunge into one of the Labor government's most controversial campaign commitments—action to nationalize Britain's steel industry. "It is known that comrade Khrushchev has also on Monday in carrying out the Marxist-Leninist policy worked out by the central committee of the Soviet Union," the communique said. "Therefore, the plenipotentiary central committee of the Soviet Union has observed that these decisions to relieve Khrushchev because comrade Khrushchev could no longer handle his tasks."

MOSCOW (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev has joined the competition for the post of premier in what the former premier used to call "the dust bin of history." Outted from his jobs of premier and Communist party secretary, Khrushchev appeared doomed—70—to finish his life in a limbo of Soviet exile reserved for political losers and "unpersons." "Life in the limbo is not uncomfortable—mainly thanks to Khrushchev himself, who dispensed with harsh Stalinist repressions against fallen politicians. Some of his most prominent residents in recent years are: Vyacheslav M. Molotov, Joseph Stalin's first premier and foreign minister and leader of the "anti-party group" that Khrushchev smashed in 1957, now lives in secluded retirement in Moscow. Another is Leonid Brezhnev, former minister and Khrushchev's old drinking and travelling companion. He also was named for his part in the anti-party plot, but is being living in retirement in Moscow. his visit would be "very brief," and it was thought likely that he would be in Bombay only for a day or two, probably at the close of the congress. In New Delhi, an Indian government spokesman said the news of the Pope's visit was like a "burst of divine light amidst the encircling gloom created by the Communist Chinese atom bomb blast."

A eucharistic congress is a major spiritual gathering held every four years. Pope Paul made his announcement of the trip during a special service in St. Peter's Basilica for the canonization of 22 Ugandan martyrs, who became the first black African saints modern times. The vast assembly roundly applauded the Pope's decision to go to Bombay. The Pope's announcement did not come as a complete surprise. There had been increasing speculation for several weeks that he would decide to go.

The visit to a land where there are only 10,000,000 Christians among a population of 440,000,000 men, the Pope's visit would dramatize the recent moves of the Roman Catholic Church for closer relations with the non-Christian world. Pope Paul's Holy Land trip in January was the first time a Pope has been outside Italy in 150 years. He went by jetliner, as he probably will to Bombay. The Bombay non-stop flight would take about eight hours.

LONDON (CP)—Sir Alec Douglas-Home seemed doubtful that he will lead a new Conservative government. The television interviewer had put time into words the query in his mind. The man who had put it became obvious the Tory party had won the election. Sir Alec Douglas-Home is leader of the Conservative Party. "I am the leader," he replied to a question. "I shall lead of course." Many others were not so sure. It has been suggested by several observers that Sir Alec always a better lecturer than he is face-to-face debater, may soon tire of the role of opposition leader. They recall also that many—if not most—Conservatives were less than happy over his selection to succeed Harold Macmillan a year ago, in a compromise to avoid a party split so soon before an election. The feeling in some Tory quarters then—one which is being revived by the news now—is that only they could answer Labour's campaign promise of a "new Britain," moderated to take its place in the 20th century. He and six of his top lieutenants are related. As for the old Tory cabinet, for example, were not called at Eton, the most elite of British schools. Nineteen others in the government also went there. Robert Carvel, respected political writer for the Conservative Evening Standard, says bluntly that Labour won because a year ago, "I picked the right leader and the Tories picked the wrong one."
