## Local and Other items.

**DIPHTHERIA AT AMHERST.**—More than a dozen cases of diphtheria were reported to the Amherst board of health during the past few weeks. Antitoxine was used in all cases and no fatalities occurred. It is believed that the epidemic is now at an end.

**TONGUE FELL OUT.**—During the ringing of a bell in the Methodist church at St. Andrews last Sunday morning the tongue of the bell became disconnected and dropped down. The bell ringer had to finish his call for the worshippers of that faith with the aid of a hammer.

**FOR THE NORTH POLE.**—Captain Bernier has already \$48,000 of the \$60,000 required by him for his North pole expedition, and expects to leave in May next on his mission. Captain Bernier, it will be remembered, was here a few months ago in command of Mr Tarte's steamer Euraka.

**SPANISH GOLD.**—The safe of the Spanish cruiser Maria Teresa, which has lain for some time in the Navy yard, at Norfolk, Va., was opened and was found to be filled with bags of Spanish and American gold and silver coin. It is estimated that the value of the treasure will reach \$75,000. The money will be turned over to the proper officials, and the safe will be sent the National Museum at Washington.

**HOW STORIES SPREAD.**—As an example of how a story grows it is related that a report recently reached Ottawa, Kan., to the effect that the coal miners at Ransomville had found a petrified snake sixty feet long and nine inches in diameter. Professor Yates, of Ottawa College hastened to Ransomville to see if the report was true. He found that the snake was a bit of petrified root eighteen inches long and half an inch in circumference.

**AN INTERESTING CHAPTER.**—A student of Spanish annals has added an interesting chapter to the history of prices by revealing from the archives of the Escorial what it cost to discover the new world. The stipends of the discoverers, at all events did not amount to much. The pay of an able seaman was only, it seems, 10 francs a month, while a captain drew only 80 francs or about 3 guineas a month. As for Christopher Columbus himself, his earnings were at the rate of 1,600 francs, or \$320 per annum. Even in Spain salaries have risen since those days.

## The Markets.

### CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS

Slight Advance in Some Instances—  
Big Shipments of Oats

The buyers report very little produce moving.

There is nothing new to note with regard to the price of oats or potatoes. There are so few on the move that it is difficult to give a fixed price.

The supply of fresh hen-fruit is very limited. But the buyers are paying 14c for what is offering, a slight advance on what was given last week.

There is also a small rise in the price of pork by the carcass. It now ranges from 4 1/2c to 5c. For live hogs the packers are paying from 3 1/2 to 4c.

### THE PROVISION MARKET.

Demand for Dressed Hogs Better—  
Other Lines Quiet

Trade in provisions on spot is quiet, says the Montreal Gazette of Tuesday, and the market in consequence is inactive, and without any special feature of note. The tone is steady, and the prices are unchanged. We quote: Canadian pork, in barrels, \$11.50 to 16; pure Canadian lard, in pails, 7 1/2c to 7 3/4c per pound, and compound refined, at 5c to 5 1/2c per pound. Hams, 10c to 12c, and bacon, 10c to 12c per pound.

The trade in dressed hogs was reported better, but as supplies were ample to fill all requirements values showed no change. Sales in a jobbing way being made at \$5.25 to \$5.75 per 100 lbs.

**LIVE HOGS.**—The Montreal Star reports: Supplies are not very heavy, but quite sufficient for the demand. Good stock can be had for \$4.35 per hundred pounds.
