A reader in Seattle sends this hand, which was played in a duplicate tournament. It appears that at virtually every table the final contract was six spades, and that in every case but one the contract was defeated one, two, or even more tricks. I am asked to comment on the bidding and play.

The bidding shown strikes me as being completely reasonable. That is to say the bidding went when Lois Barde, playing with her husband, Ted, held the South hand.

Having first signed off with two diamonds, North could well afford to jump to four spades when his hand took on greatly added value as support for a spade contract. South could hardly bid less than six opposite the enthusiastic raise.

It is not hard to figure out why so many of the South players were defeated in the slam contract. Undoubtedly, they attempted to overruff the hand, ruffing as many hearts or clubs in dummy as they could.

But there weren't enough trumps in dummy for this course of play to succeed, and, after a while, these declarers ran out of steam, going down various amounts of tricks.

It is a strange thing that so many declarers suffer a blind spot when playing this type of hand. The attitude should be that dummy is the master hand and should take the bulk of the tricks.

Declarer need not worry about the heart and club losers he has. Instead, he should concentrate on establishing the diamond suit in dummy. If he can build up the diamonds, the hearts and clubs will take care of themselves.

Mrs. Barde made the slam in jig time. She won the spade lead in dummy with the ten, cashed the ace of diamonds, and trumped a low diamond, West's king falling. Then she overtook the jack of spades with the queen, cashed the spade ace, and conceded the jack of diamonds to the queen.

Dummy now had the rest of the tricks in conjunction with Mrs. Barde's two aces. That's all there was to it.

Pravda Assails Iranian Gov't

MOSCOW (AP) — Pravda assailed the Iranian government Sunday, asserting in effect that clauses of the 1921 Soviet-Iranian treaty giving the Soviet Union the right to enter Iran with armed forces under certain conditions remain effective.

The Communist party organ carried an article by Soviet international law authority S. Golinsky which said that renunciation by the Iranian government, announced March 2 in Tehran, of clauses five and six of the 21-year-old agreement, was a clumsy attempt by Iran to get rid of its obligations.

The Soviet-Iranian controversy over the 1921 treaty is more than academic. Only a northwestern wedge of Iranian territory separates Communist-influence Iraq from the Soviet Union. And the Soviet Union is charging that Iran is permitting the United States to use Iran as a springboard for attack on the Soviet Union.

It is the Iranian position that the clauses of the 1921 treaty giving the Russians the right to send armed forces into Iran have no longer any validity. The Iranians say the clauses envisaged only possible threats to the young Soviet republic by anti-Communist emigre forces from Iranian territory, a possibility no longer real. They cite the fact the Soviet government subsequently specifically agreed with this interpretation in a diplomatic exchange formally incorporated into the 1921 treaty.

The Soviet government, however, apparently desires to ignore this modification of the original treaty. In fact it cited the 1921 treaty in 1941 as legal justification for occupation, jointly with British forces, of Iranian territory.

Halifax Mayor Denies Move To Stop Housing Criticism

HALIFAX (CP) — Mayor Charles A. Vaughan has denied that he had brought pressure to bear to stop a month-long campaign against inadequate housing and high rents conducted by the Shearwater Naval Air Station's weekly *Navalair*.

The mayor was commenting Saturday on a statement by Lt.-Cmdr. John Jordan, chief of the paper's editorial staff, who said he resigned because Admiral Hugh Pullen, Atlantic naval chief, ruled the paper must discontinue the campaign. He said in a televised interview here Friday night that the admiral made the decision because of pressure from the mayor.

"At no time did I suggest to the admiral that he should censor articles," Mayor Vaughan said.

ARTICLE INACCURATE

The mayor said he had pointed out to the admiral that a social function that an article by Lt.-Cmdr. Jordan was inaccurate.

Capt. R. P. Welland, Shearwater commanding officer, said in a statement Saturday he had been informed the article was inaccurate and pointed this out to Lt.-Cmdr. Jordan.

"On my own volition I told him we would not publish any future material on housing, as the matter had been sufficiently aired," said Capt. Welland.

"Lt.-Cmdr. Jordan apparently misconstrued my private instructions as applying censorship from the outside. As publisher of the *Navalair*, I can state no attempt has ever been made by anyone to dictate the policy of the *Navalair*. Any statement to the contrary is quite untrue."

The weekly appeared Friday with no mention of its campaign for better housing.

WHOLESALE SALES RISE

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian wholesalers rang up \$7,624,300,000 in sales last year or 2.1 per cent more than the \$7,466,500,000 in 1957. Gains were posted by 11 of the 17 trades listed, with increases ranging from a fifth of a point in wholesale clothing sales to a full 16 per cent for farm machinery. Coal and coke sales declined by almost 16 per cent to lead the six trades posting reduced value.

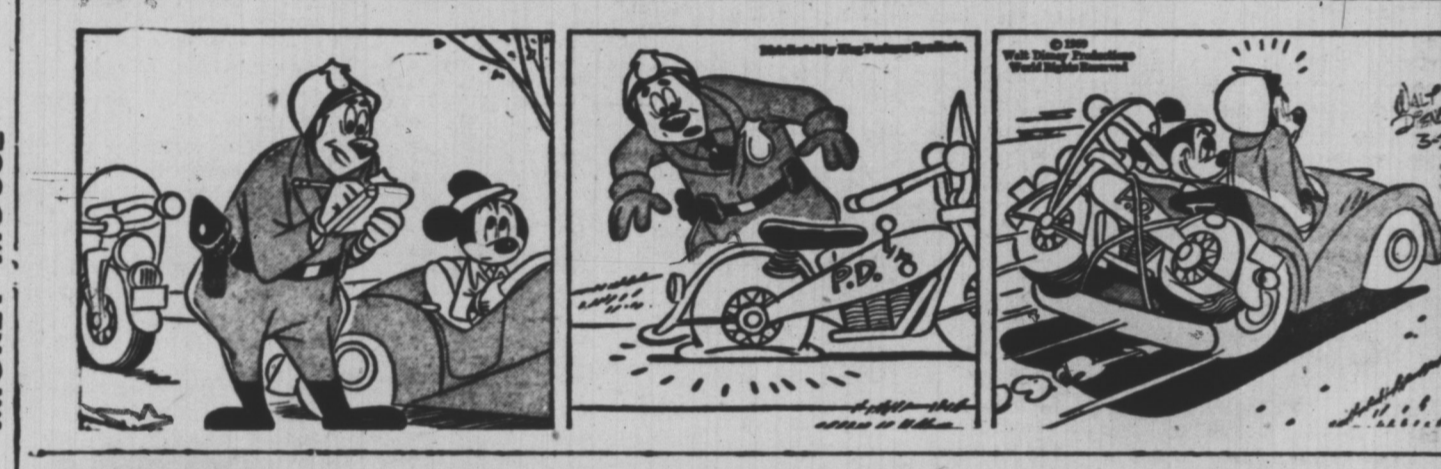
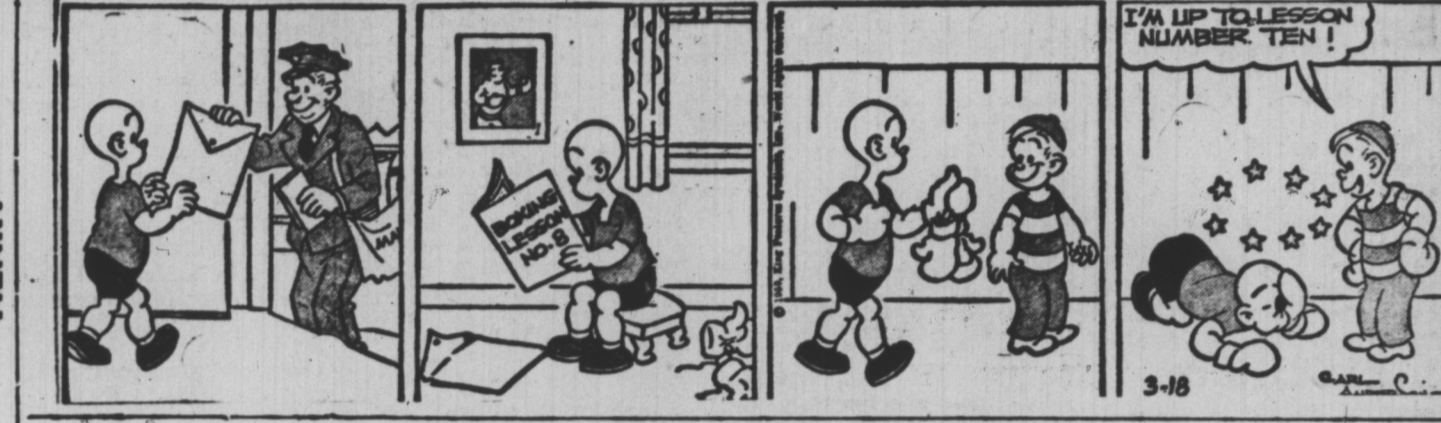
