## NCW Back Resolutions For Art Study In Schools

**WASAGAMING, Man. (CP)—**The National Council of Women of Canada will study the possibility of a higher achievement standard in governmental training of future applicants for Canadian citizenship.

The standard, based on training in language and citizenship, would be used for the guidance of the courts in examining applicants.

The study plan was contained in one of several resolutions passed here Saturday during the annual meeting of the council. About 125 delegates are attending.

The council was told it was questionable whether applicants for citizenship have sufficient understanding of the official languages or of the principles and form of the Canadian government.

### BACK ART STUDY

Resolutions backing the study of art in Canadian schools called for the appointment of art super-

visors to local school boards and a provincial director of art education to co-ordinate the art education program within each province, and the inclusion of art lessons in regular school broadcast schedules.

It also resolved to review the matter of federal aid to Eskimos. On capital punishment, a resolution said the organization should study the subject of capital punishment "and consider its abolition or continuation." In order to decide whether the national council should assume any responsibility of leadership in the question.

Minimum security penal institutions are urgently needed in Canada, council was told by the Montreal local, which said the present member of maximum security prisons is sufficient.

But council did not pass the resolution that its branches across Canada become acquainted with the problem.

The six-day meeting concludes Tuesday.

### Automatic Dish Washer Saves Time And Effort

"Automation is much slower coming into the home kitchen than into restaurants," observed the Chef. "Restaurant owners were the first to introduce pressure cookers, to install food freezers, to have accurate automatic coffee-making devices and automatic dish washers."

"The dish washers saved the cost of hundreds of man-hours of labor and insured sanitary clean dishes, possible only when dishes are washed in water at 186 degrees F., popularly known as scalding point."

"Why is it that more homemakers do not have automatic dish washers, Madame?"  
"Partly custom, Chef," I replied. "For centuries women have always washed dishes. Some seem to feel it's part of married life. Many have a guilt complex about buying a machine to do this chore. Others feel it cannot be afforded."

"However, the advantages offset the cost. Automation makes the washing and drying of dishes quick and easy. It can control the time when it is to be done and insures a tidy kitchen and really sanitary eating ware."

"New compact dish washers have the capacity to automatically wash and dry, at one time, all the dishes used in an entire day by the average family of four. It is as old-fashioned to wash and dry dishes by hand as it would be to use a broom instead of a vacuum cleaner."

"I most sincerely advise budgeting the income to make possible the purchase of an automatic dish washer. It will promote good health, save time and take a lot of 'self pity' out of housework."

**SUNDAY DINNER**  
Chilled Grapefruit Sections  
Roast Rolled Shoulder of Lamb  
Vegetable Stuffing  
Pan-Roast Potatoes  
Diced Sparsagus  
Ginger Sundaes  
Coffee Tea Milk

Measurements are level; recipes for 6.  
Vegetable Stuffing: Steam-saute for 10 min. 1 c. chopped fresh mushrooms and stems, 1 coarse-grated large carrot, 1 c. chopped celery and 1 chopped, peeled onion in 2 tbsp. each corn oil and water.  
Mix and add ¼ c. mashed solid-pack tomato, 1 tsp. mint flakes, 1 tsp. salt, ¼ tsp. pepper and 2 c. prepared poultry stuffing crumbs.  
Stir - saute until moisture evaporates.  
Cool. Use as stuffing for Roast Rolled Shoulder of Lamb. It's also good with veal, chicken or fish.  
Ginger Sundaes: In sherbet glasses, put 1 scoop each orange

sherbet and vanilla ice cream. Spoon over 1 tbsp. chopped preserved ginger and little syrup.

New England Clam Chowder  
Pan Fish Saute  
Salad of Cooked Vegetables  
Apple-Pricot Crumb Pie  
Coffee Tea Milk  
Apple-Pricot Crumb Pie: Line 9" pie plate with American pie pastry. Flute edges, prick in 6 places with fork.  
Next, combine 2½ c. canned apple slices with 1 c. stewed dried apricots, 1 tbsp. quick-cooking tapioca, ¼ c. brown sugar, ¼ tsp. salt and ¼ tsp. cinnamon.  
Cover with crumb topping.  
Bake 15 min. in hot oven, 425 degrees F. Reduce heat to 350 F.
