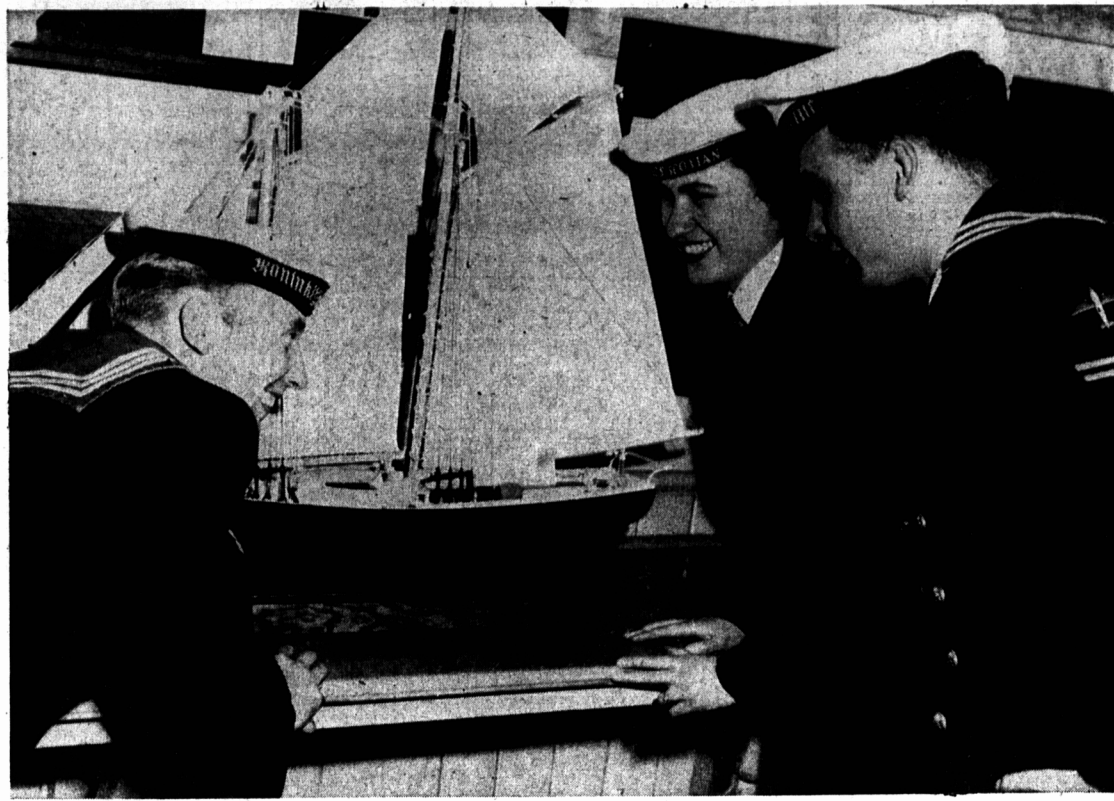


Dutch Sailors Visit Maritime's Historical Centers

Rate War Feared By Trucking Industry

OTTAWA (CP)—Fear of a rate war between the railways and trucks in Ontario and Quebec was expressed today by the chief spokesman for Canada's trucking industry.

G. M. Parke of Toronto, president of Canadian Trucking Associations, accused the railways of undermining the trucks' interprovincial rate structure by recent drastic cuts.

He said the truckers will have to take retaliatory measures. Mr. Parke's statement, issued from CTA headquarters here, was prompted by what he described as "drastic rate cuts on rail merchandise moving between Montreal and Toronto and Montreal and Hamilton."

A CTA spokesman said later "the reductions undercut the truck rates sharply."

"The trucking industry is able to protect its competitive position and can be expected to do so," Mr. Parke said.

He said that with very few more examples of "irresponsibility" on the part of both industries, a general rate war could break out that would shatter any hope of favorable 1953 operating results for the truck industry and the two big railways.
