[June 7 wky] The Montreal, Halifax and Boston Steamship Co.'s, steamer Titian, Capt. Noad, arrived this morning. The Titian is an iron screw steamer, two hundred and forty feet long, thirty feet beam and 1,249 tons burden. She was built in 1870, and has since been doing good work. She has splendid accommodation for sixty-first class passengers, and is admirably fitted for a passenger and freight boat. It is the intention of the Company to run two other boats on the route between Montreal and Boston during the season. They will call fortnightly at the following ports: Montreal, Quebec, Gaspe, Percy, Summerside, Charlottetown, Pictou, Halifax and Boston. The Titian is quite a fast boat. She made the passage from Gaspe to Summerside in twenty hours, and from Summerside to Charlottetown in three hours and twenty minutes. Her captain is a young man of large experience. PEOPLE'S CEMETERY COMPANY.—A meeting of the Shareholders of the above Company was held to-day, and, after a formal organization of the Company, the following gentlemen were elected as Directors for the coming year:— President—Hon. Republican Convention.

WILD ENTHUSIASM BLAINE SELECTED.

Logan for Vice-President

CHICAGO, June 6. The Convention Hall was densely crowded all day, and from the very start there was the wildest enthusiasm and excitement, which increased as the balloting progressed. When the result of the second ballot was announced, showing again for Blaine, the Convention went wild with excitement. At this time it was announced that Logan would transfer his strength to Blaine, and the next ballot would thus render Blaine's nomination certain. After some time order was restored, and the final ballot resulted as follows:—Blaine, 541; Arthur, 207; Edwards, 41; Hawley, 15; Logan, 7; Lincoln, 2; John Sherman none. After the announcement of the official count the Convention took recess. At the evening session the work of nominating a Vice-President was begun. After a telegram had been received from Logan, saying that he would accept the Vice-Presidency, he was unanimously elected as the candidate for the Vice-Presidency. BOSTON, June 6. Expressions of opinion as to the wisdom of Blaine and Logan's nominations, among both Democrats and Republicans, are various and diversified. Some Democratic organs rejoice over the nomination, claiming that its weakness will enable them to elect their candidates. The majority of Republican papers say that Blaine and Logan will be found invincible.

A British Turnout.

CAIRO, June 5. The whole British garrison paraded the streets of the city yesterday for the purpose of impressing the natives and overawing the secret societies. Sentinels have been doubled because of a rumored attempt to explode the citadel.

The Dynamiters.

LONDON, June 7. The English Government has drawn the attention of the French authorities to the immunity enjoyed by dynamiters in Paris in laying plans and making preparations for outrages.

Blaine Leads.

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 7. Blaine has received the nomination with Arthur second. Blaine led on the whole three ballots by a small number over Arthur.

Shoemakers on the Strike.

PHILADELPHIA, June 6. The shoemakers of this city are on a strike. The number exceeds 600.

In that great cloister's stillness, and seclusion, By guardian angels led, Safe from temptations, safe from sin's pollution, She lives, whom we call dead." At his residence, No. 161 Brunswick Street, Halifax, N. S., on the 27th May, after a short illness, James Brennan, in the 40th year of his age. It is with feelings of regret that we chronicle the death of Hugh McDonald, of Dundas, which occurred on the 25th ult., at the early age of twenty-eight years. About four weeks ago, while riding to Georgetown, he was suddenly taken ill, and having fallen from his horse, lay in a semi-comatose state for ten hours. Several passed by, but paid him no attention, until a good Samaritan came that way, who took him to his house and did all in his power to minister to his wants. Drs. Kaye and McLaren were unceasing in their efforts to save him; but death was too strong for human skill, and the subject of our obituary succumbed to the inevitable.

The Steamship Bonavista.

There arrived in the harbor of Montreal, on the 2nd inst., a steamship which, although not registered in a Dominion port, is a bona fide part of the increasing Canadian merchant marine, and a practical evidence of the enterprise of Montreal business men. The Black Diamond steamship line, a comparatively new venture, has developed a trade between Montreal, Quebec, the Gulf Ports and Newfoundland which a few years ago would have been thought improbable; but the far-seeing ones who made the initial venture in that direction have demonstrated the value of the business relations between the points mentioned, each season of navigation showing an increase in the cargoes and passenger lists of the steamers on their various trips. In building the Bonavista the managers of the Black Diamond line have shown a more than usual regard for the comfort and convenience of passengers who may use that vessel as a means of transportation. The day has scarcely passed when passengers to the Gulf Ports had to put up with but scanty accommodation in order that cargo room might not be infringed upon. The cabin of the Bonavista offers not only comfort to the man of business, but also luxuries to the tourist, individually or collectively, the staterooms being arranged to accommodate families and others who may desire privacy. Forty saloon passengers can be carried without trouble. The smoking room, lavatory, ladies bathroom and exclusive cabin are models of elegance, and fitted up in the best style of upholstery. The panellings of the saloon are of maple, rosewood and ebony, tinted in the most esthetic manner in delicate shades. A steward (Mr. W. Holmes) and stewardess pay all necessary attention to passengers. The vessel also has good accommodation for second-class passengers, situated amidships. Twenty can be berthed in comfortable style. The Bonavista (probably named after Bonavista Bay, Newfoundland) was built to order this spring at Newcastle-on-Tyne at the Neptune Works of Messrs. Wigham, Richardson & Co., her number being 172 and tonnage 836. Her engines are of the compound surface condensing description. The high pressure cylinder is 31 inches in diameter, the low pressure 62 inches; stroke, 42 inches. The nominal horse-power is 170, but the engines are capable of being worked up to a greater pressure. The furnaces are fed from six fire holes, the consumption of coal per day being an average of 17 tons. Mr. Richard Glass, the chief engineer, who was on the steamship Good Hope, of London, a vessel formerly trading to the St. Lawrence, pointed out to the reporter a number of the excellencies of the new ship. She made the run from Sydney to Montreal in three days eighteen hours, including a detention of five hours, which is considered good time. During the voyage out heavy weather was experienced, and prevented any fair trial of the engines being made. Mr. Glass, however, remarked that the Bonavista would not be behind any of the St. Lawrence vessels of her size for speed. Captain D. Anderson commands this latest addition to the Montreal fleet, who, with his chief officer, Mr. D. C. Fraser, will be remembered as having been on the Valetta a few seasons ago. The ship has a crew of twenty-six men all told. She is schooner-rigged, provided with steam steering gear, four lifeboats, and all the latest mechanical inventions necessary for the navigation of a steamship. Messrs. Kingman, Brown & Co., are the Bonavista's agents at Montreal. Messrs. Peake Bros. & Co., are agents for the Black Diamond Line at this port. DR. TANNER has come to reside in Minneapolis, although there are now 400 doctors in the city. It is comforting to know that if the worst comes to the worst Dr. Tanner can live on nothing—and our pure air.—Canadian American. THE cricket match between the Philadelphia team and the gentlemen of Ireland team was resumed at Dublin on the 5th. The Americans were easily victorious, winning by six wickets. 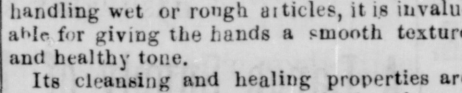
