NOTICE TOWN OF SUMMERSIDE Qualifications of Voters

Section 68 and amendments thereto of the Summerside Incorporation Act, 1903 reads in part as follows:

"Voters' lists shall contain and be made up of the names of (a) All persons males or females (being a widow or unmarried) of the age of 21 years and upwards, being British subjects and residents or non-residents of the said Town, who have been assessed in the Assessment Books and Lists next previous to the election about to be held, upon Property in the said Town of the assessed value of \$100.00 and upwards, and all married women of the age of 21 years and upwards being British subjects and residents or non-residents of the said Town, who have been assessed in the Assessment Books and Lists next previous to the election about to be held, upon Real Estate in said Town of the assessed value of one hundred dollars and upwards.

(b) Every male inhabitant of the said Town being of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in the said Town for at least one year then next preceding the day of such election, who shall be a British subject and shall have been assessed in the sum of one dollar and upwards of Poll Tax.
