WESTERN OPINION.

L'IMPARTIAL, whose editor assisted at the Provincial conference of cheese-makers as a delegate from Tignish Factory of which he is secretary, does not appear to think much of the proceedings. In the first place, our western contemporary takes Premier Farquharson severely to task for his "gross and cruel treatment" of Mr. Dillon who is declared to have done more for the Province than all the Premiers we have had since Confederation, and to whose extraordinary efforts and sacrifices we owe our whole cheese industry of to-day. "After this ruffianly treatment of Mr. Dillon," L'Impartial says, "the whole meeting degenerated into a veritable bear garden, and free speech and any deliberative action was completely suppressed by the little autocratic Premier. Mr. Weeks an intelligent citizen of the west, and with no superior as to the practical knowledge of the cheese industry, was insulted, too, because, forsooth, he would not fall down and adore the ministerial calf." L'Impartial continues.

"Is it not truly ridiculous, is it not supremely disgusting, to discover that we are reduced to such straits. Imagine delegates formally invited by an interminable array of incoherent circulars, sent out by the designing Premier, travelling 100 miles to take part in what was thought to be deliberations on questions of vital importance to our dairying interests, treated with insult and contempt and their mouths shut, because they should dare to give expression to opinions unbecoming to the despot who invited them to town. If this is not tyranny, pure and unalloyed, we would like to have its meaning."

"The idea of an inspector is not regarded favorably in the province. This the delegates made clear, even in the confusion of the meeting, and Professor Robertson himself upheld them. Said the professor, "an inspector is not at all necessary, what you want is an instructor." An instructor we are willing to have and are desirous of having also; but an inspector we'll have nothing to do with for the simple reason that everyone knows that he would have to be a mere tool and heeler of Premier Farquharson, whether or not he could distinguish a cheese from a full moon.

"Truth to say we have come to a pretty pass to be fooled like this to our faces. We are loaded down with the weight of a worthless regime until it can be no longer endured. The people's voice counts for nothing at all where selfish political interests enter. We are condemned to obey the dictum of the most worthless and arbitrary Government which ever cursed the land, and at long last it is thought the proper thing to gather us together that we may be more conveniently insulted."

"Never did the walls of the hall witness a bigger farce than that at the Kindergarten on Tuesday last. We do not hesitate in saying, that apart from Mr. Moore, of Crapaud, and a few other henchmen of the Premier, every delegate there returned home disgusted and humiliated."

—Commenting on one of the recent delays of our mails, the Agriculturist says: "This is an outrage on the people of Prince Edward Island, and the Charlottetown Board of Trade, the business men of Summerside, and all others interested, ought to make a vigorous kick against it, especially as the season of bad roads is now setting in, and these annoying delays in the mail service may be expected to continue until there is a return to the modern method of carrying the mails—namely, by train."

Navy Reorganization.

LONDON, March 11.—The Berlin correspondent of the Standard, commenting on the resignation of Admiral Von Knorr, as commander-in-chief of the German navy, says: "It is probable that the resignation is a prelude to the reorganization of naval control. The post of commander-in-chief is likely to be abolished and the navy to be placed directly under Emperor William and his naval cabinet."

A RUSSIAN VIEW

Count Cassini and Certain Phases of the Eastern Question.

NEW YORK, March 11.—The Russian ambassador, Count Cassini, is probably the best authority in Washington on certain phases of the Eastern question. He was for many years the Czar's representative in Peking, and it was he who obtained from China the first important concessions regarding the Siberian railroad. Count Cassini consented to-day to give his views on the Chinese situation, says a Washington special to the World:

"There are so many ways of viewing the open door proposal and so many interpretations to be placed upon it" said the Russian Ambassador "that it is a delicate subject to discuss. I took the issue with Lord Charles Bessford, and I think made my position plain. Now a new aspect is presented, and we are faced with the proposition which Italy's action in China has made possible. Russian's attitude is not changed by this action. (We have never opposed the open door,) and consequently we take no other attitude than that which has been plainly announced from our foreign office many times. "But we are wondering what our great neighbor to the west, the United States, will do in this emergency. "It would seem now that the United States would be forced by the necessities of the case to take part in the negotiation of the nations concerning China's commercial existence. As in Russia there are in the United States tremendous interests at stake, a world in itself, where the wealth of a large part of the country needs an outlet. Of course I can speak only for Russia, but there seems a similarity of interests to guard and to promote. Russia is at the entrance of her industrial and commercial development, and she will endeavor to shield this development from all that might retard it. We have vast countries just awakening from the lethargy of centuries becoming grain land and pasture countries, and from the outlet on the Chinese sea hope to enter the commercial field in the four quarters of the globe. By our Siberian R. R., we will carry to Europe the treasures of India and China. The tea production will bring us in an annual income of 40,000,000 roubles. Other staple products yield a proportionate figure. Then it is hoped to extend our merchant marine across to your great western countries and bring your over-abundance into Asia and Africa.

For this reason Russia would welcome the United States as a factor in the councils of the nations that must of necessity govern the East. We have never, officially or unofficially, protested against the American occupation of the Philippines. "On the contrary we have welcomed the United States in coming nearer to us, as one friend comes to another. "It was a source of much gratification to me that Mr. Hitchcock, lately ambassador to St. Petersburg, lately told the American people about the attitude of Russia before and since the Spanish war. It would be expected that Russia's ambassador here would say that nothing hostile had been done against your country by his own. His position would be otherwise untenable. But Mr. Hitchcock is a disinterested witness, and when he has so cordially and so eloquently reiterated what I have said to the American people for many months I am, of course, deeply grateful.

Russia maintains her old historic attitude towards America. She was one of the first to aid the founders of the republic and she has been through its growth a sympathetic and sincere friend.

During the civil war she did her part when its existence was threatened, and if during the war which has been fought the United States had needed the aid of Russia it would have been given as freely and as fully as in the past. There have been many to assert very different things of Russia's feeling towards America, and there are still some who say that Russia had ulterior intentions in endeavoring to draw the United States into the Chinese question. Time and the authority of our own ambassador to St. Petersburg have proved the falsity of the first proposition and of the second it can be said that Russia is not trying to draw the United States into the Chinese question, but if the United States, with her vast commercial interests, sees fit to take a voice in deciding this important issue, Russia will be the first to welcome her to co-operate in finding a just and satisfactory solution of its difficulties."

HAYDEN'S THIRTY-YEAR BULK.

Wouldn't Put His Feet on the Earth Because He Lost His "Niggers."

BARDSTOWN, Ky., March 11.—Living ten miles east of this place is one of the most singular characters in the state. Now in his seventy-fifth year, he has not touched his foot to the earth for over thirty years. Living in a comfortable residence, surrounded by many acres of the best land in Nelson county he is spending his declining years in solitude.

Basil Hayden is one of the wealthiest farmers in a district composed of half a dozen counties, and is descended from a family well known in the pioneer annals of the state. Many of them have also been distinguished in the different lines of life.

Basil Hayden, or "the Hermit," as he is known throughout the section in which he lives, in his youth was a social leader and very popular with a large circle of friends. When the war broke out he entered the Confederate army and made a good soldier to the end. When he returned home he found his slaves free and his property greatly damaged. The emancipation of his negroes effected him seriously and he brooded over it constantly. He became sullen and morose, declining all overtures of friendliness on the part of his neighbors. He declared the Lord had dealt harshly and unjustly with him in depriving him of his slaves, and out of revenge he registered a terrible oath that he never again would put his foot to the Lord's ground. And so far he has kept his vow.

Never since its registration has he appeared without his door, nor will he have converse with any save two, and then his words are of the briefest possible character. His land interests are extensive, and, under the management of a competent overseer, yield him a handsome income. The overseer makes his report to the queer old man in his darkened retreat, who gives his directions and orders as tersely as possible. He has never spoken to a woman in any manner since his self-imposed exile, nor will he allow one to be employed upon his place.
