

# Black Hawks Crush Rangers 6-3 To Take Over 2nd Spot In NHL

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 — (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks went into second place in the tight National Hockey League race tonight by crushing the tallied Rangers, 6-3, in one of the roughest games of the season at Madison Square Garden.

Chicago took over the runner-up slot from the idle Montreal Canadiens by one point. The win was Chicago's sixth in eight meetings with Rangers.

The largest New York crowd of the season, 13,803, watched the game. Hawks took a 2-1 lead in the first period on goals by Jimmy Peters and George Gee.

New York took a 3-2 lead during the first four minutes of play in the second period with the high-scoring line of Paul Ronty, Neil Strain and Wally Hergeshimer figuring in all of the goals.

Only sensational goal-tending by Al Rollins prevented Rangers from taking a commanding lead. Hawks, bottled up for the first 10 minutes, led the score shortly after the half-way mark with Peters punching home his second goal of the game.

With less than two minutes to go, little Scotty Bodnar electrified the crowd with a brilliant goal while his teammate, Gee, was in the penalty box. Bodnar skated nearly the length of the rink, neatly felled Chuck Rayner out of position, and scored.

Hawks completely dominated the final period. Couture shot Hawks ahead 5-3 and Fred Hucul wrapped it up with a 20-footer.

DETROIT, Dec. 28 — (AP) — Gordie Howe, Ted Lindsay and Marty Pavelich each scored twice tonight as the first-place Detroit Red Wings romped through their 15th straight game without defeat by crushing fifth-place Boston Bruins 7-1 in a National Hockey League game.

The goals were the 20th and 21st of the season for Howe, first man to reach 20 in the NHL this season. And two assists gave him a total of 41 points, also tops.

Lindsay's were his 15th and 16th to tie for the No. 2 spot, while Pavelich's were his eighth and ninth.

In addition, Red Kelly contributed his 10th to the Detroit cause.

Rookie Glen Hall was playing his second game in the nets for the injured Terry Sawchuk. His shutout attempt was spoiled early. Penitz, Lund hitting for his fourth for Bruins early in the second period.

Detroit carried a 40-21 shooting edge in the contest, played before 12,242 fans.

## Six Major League Ball Managers In On Oil Strike

MAGNOLIA, Ark., Dec. 28 — (AP) — Six major-league managers, including Casey Stengel and Charlie Grimm—saw their oil well come in Saturday.

Dick Burnett, millionaire Texas oil man and owner of the Texas League Dallas Eagles, brought in the Crockett No. 1, in which at least 11 big-league managers had a share. Burnett said the well would produce 75 to 100 barrels a day.

Other familiar baseball names who had a stake in the well and were present were Carl Hubbell, former ace left-hander of New York Giants and now a club official, and Mike Higgins, former American League infielder.

Partners in the well who couldn't be in on festivities were managers Fred Haney of Pittsburgh Pirates, Eddie Stanky of St. Louis Cardinals, Al Lopez of Cleveland, General-Manager Hank Greenberg of the Indians, Gabe Paul, Cincinnati official, and Jerome "Dizzy" Dean, former Cardinal pitcher.

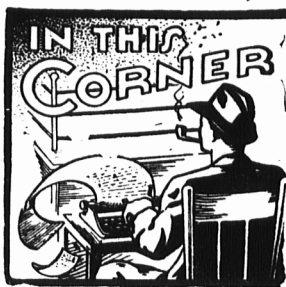
Second division leaders were unchanged. Sheffield United was idle, but still has a three-point lead over the division despite second place Huddersfield's 3-3 tie at Swansea.

## Atlantics In 4-3 Win Over Islanders In Rugged Game

HALIFAX, Dec. 28 — (Special) — The Halifax Atlantics extended their winning streak over the Charlottetown Islanders here Saturday night as winger Billy Gooled scored an over-time goal to give the Atlantics a 4-3 win over the Islanders in a bitterly fought game before a crowd of 4,570 fans. Gooled's a blistering 20-foot shot from the side of the net, climaxed the penalty-infested contest in which the two teams battled tooth-and-nail from beginning to end.

The little winger's counter, his second of the night, spoiled a terrific bid by the Islanders to snap the Halifax victory string. Twice the Islanders, led by their deluxe delivery boy Buck Whitlock, came from behind to tie up the game with spectacular efforts.

Halifax appeared to have the game won in the third period before the Islanders forced the contest into overtime with a brilliant executed play that rocked the large crowd in the Halifax Forum.

Coach Murph Chamberlain lifted goalie Al Millar in favor of the extra forward with a minute and twenty seconds left in regulation time. Following a face-off in the Halifax end Whitlock got the puck, circled the net and slipped the disc into the far corner to make the count 3-3. The goal was Whitlock's second of the night.

Buck's first goal was a great piece of work but his second was good as an exhibition of team play as one will ever see. The Islanders were playing with the extra forward in the hope of getting back in the game during the closing stages of the third period. From a face-off in the Halifax end Buck took the puck and every other Islander took a man out of the play. Buck circled the net and two of his team-mates gave him coverage as he skated out front. When he got into position Buck slipped the puck into the far corner to stun the crowd, many of whom were on their way out of the Forum.

This city was still buzzing today with talk of the game and the big second period brawl around the Halifax net. It was Gus Gustavson who stunned the crowd on this occasion with his Marciano-like disposal of Joe Lepine. The fight started between Lepine and Beaurieu. After the two were separated Lepine continued to go after Hub. At this point from both teams came off the bench. Gustavson attempted to break up the fight but he and Lepine were slugging it. The Big Swede downed Jolin' Joe, jumped on him and pummeled him with his fists.

Wiseman and MacLaughlin slugger out at the same time and fight threatened to break out all over the ice surface. Finally the police went over the boards and the presence of the ten uniformed constables appeared to quiet matters. Possibly the most vicious fight of all was staged in the first period between Gary Gordon and Bob Hayes. The battle between Ron Hurst and Bloom was no love affair either.

Goalies Al Millar and Roy MacMeekin were very good. Each netminder turned aside at least half a dozen breakaway attempts. Billy Watson, Muckle Hollett, Bob Bow-King, Dugger MacNeil and Kenny Lauffman all rode in on Millar with clean breaks only to be turned aside. For the Islanders Bob Gray, Wiseman, Clements, Pawlyshyn and Hurst had great scoring opportunities but failed to click.

Actually there was little similarity between the game here and the contest between the same two teams in Charlottetown on Friday night. Saturday's game was marked with fight, fire and drive that was so noticeably absent from the game of the night before. The Islanders' forwards were digging, tearing into the corners and their defense was strong. Passing mention should be made of Marcel Clements—Marcel was probably the best forward the Islanders had out on the ice as he turned in a tremendous performance.

A clap on the back is also due Chuck Holdaway. 20-year-old Chuck played Saturday night despite the fact he was told he may be suffering from an ulcer. Holdaway has not been feeling too well this past week or so and is supposed to undergo another examination today. Nevertheless the kid played a top-notch game here Saturday as Murph Chamberlain used him at centre between Clements and Wiseman. Into the same category could go Larry Travis. Larry has a badly bruised ankle, so badly bruised in fact he has trouble lacing his skates. Larry, however, played a stellar defensive game.

TORONTO, Dec. 28 — (CP) — A gangling 18-year-old forward led the way Saturday night as Toronto Maple Leafs blanked Boston Bruins 3-0 here before 12,832 National Hockey League fans.

Eric Nesterenko, up from Toronto Marlboro Juniors under the N.H.L.'s three-game lend-lease arrangement with amateur clubs, scored two clean-cut goals and set up the other one for line-mate Gordie Hanngan.

Also in the limelight was Goalle Lumley, who turned in his third shutout of the season and his second in as many games. His last was a 2-0 decision over Montreal Canadiens here Christmas eve. Saturday night Bruins directed only 15 shots to handle against only 15 for Montreal's Gerry McNeil.

Glen Skov and Red Sinclair scored for Wings and Doug Harvey and Bernie (Bocm Boom) Geoffrion for Canadiens.

Red Wings had two rookie newcomers in addition to Hall-Marcel Bonin from St. Louis Flyers on the forward line and Jim Hay from Edmonton on defence. Canadiens still minus injured centres Elmer Lack and Billy Reay, used Gerry Desautiers from Montreal Royals of the Quebec Senior League.

MONTREAL, Dec. 28 — (CP) — Detroit Red Wings and Montreal Canadiens, with a sprinkling of rookies in the line-ups, battled to a 2-2 tie Saturday night before 14,474 fans.

The draw gave Canadiens a one-point margin over Chicago Black Hawks for second place in the National Hockey League standings, while Detroit retained a five-point lead at the top.
