Rotary Luncheon At Experimental Farm Yesterday

Guest speaker at the Charlottetown Rotary Club luncheon yesterday was the Hon. R. H. Winters, Federal Minister of Resources and Development. The luncheon was held in a spacious marquee on the grounds of the Experimental Farm, and it was followed by an interesting parade of outstanding farm livestock and some of the latest developments in farm machinery.

The program was arranged by Rotarian R. C. Parent, Farm Superintendent, who also presided at the luncheon. Emphasizing the importance of maintaining the national resources of the country, Mr. Winters dealt particularly with forestry conservation. While forests are the direct responsibility of the Provincial Government, the Provinces alone cannot do the work and the Federal Government has undertaken to assist them. The Canadian Forestry Act of 1949 provides for joint participation. It was subsequently agreed that if the Provincial Governments would take inventories of all their forest resources, the Dominion would help them to do it.

Notre Dame Convent Art Pupils' Display

A display of art work by pupils and students which has been showing at Notre Dame Convent for the past few days has been creating much interest. The exhibition is by pupils of grades 5 to 11, and includes work by special art students. All pieces, shown are the results of study under Sister Saint Margaret.

Taking up an entire classroom, many mediums and techniques of painting are included, and there are pieces of newer work which of late has not been as popular as the beauty of this art merits. An entire table is taken with leather craft of which many outstanding samples are shown. A poster display which takes up an entire wall includes six prize-winners from the recent Provincial competition, and shows many excellent examples of the results obtained from an idea. Many of the posters are accompanied by a charcoal and water color sketch of the artist pupil.

Also shown are a few pieces of burnt wood art, mostly made into trays. The design is burnt in and then colored, very thinly, allowing the grain to show through. The display will be open this morning and will close at noon today.

Life Saving Medallion Presented To Member Of West Kent School Cadets

The Bronze Medallion of the Royal Life Saving Society of London, England, was presented yesterday afternoon to Cadet, Lieut. Robert Hutchison of the West Kent School Cadet Corps following their annual inspection conducted by Brig. G. K. Peake, D.S.O.

Announced as an award of outstanding significance issued by the Department of National Defence, the medallion was one of only seven awarded last summer at Camp Aldershot in a camp of 750 cadets. It was the principal award during the afternoon. It was awarded to Lieut. Hutchison after the successful completion of all tests in a series designed to show all round ability in the water, particularly in swimming.

Led by their own smartly turned out band under direction of Bandmaster Cadet Capt. George Hurry, the cadets presented a splendid appearance as they marched on Memorial Field for the inspection. ground. When that is determined, we are going to ask the Provinces to step up their programmes of reforestation, to which the Federal Government will contribute. "In the inventory arrangements the Federal Government will match the Provincial Governments dollar for dollar, and in the reforestation programme it will put up 25 percent of the money expended by the Provincial Governments, provided their rate of expenditure does not decrease below the level they have attained in the last three years. I think that programme, small as it may seem, will have the desired effect of focusing the attention of Canadians upon the importance of our forest resources."

He added that the various Provincial Governments are now working on this programme at the provincial and municipal levels. The Minister also referred to the potential wealth of the Northwest Territories and the Yukon. "I think, to a great extent, the future of Canada and our expanding prosperity lies in our still undeveloped resources in the north country," he said, "and that in the very near future we are going to see that this country, which heretofore has been regarded as a barren waste-land, will be an area of which all Canadians will be proud and which certainly will contribute very greatly to the general prosperity of Canada."

Hon. Mr. Winters was introduced at yesterday's luncheon by Premier J. Walter Jones. The vote of thanks was tendered by Rotarian George Walters who, like Mr. Winters, is a native of Lunenburg. Minister Of Resources At The Empire Theatre

Termining the new plan for payment of \$40 a month pensions to all 70 years of age or over without a means test "one of the most progressive steps to be taken," Hon. Robert H. Winters, Minister of Resources, Ottawa, also briefly told of other pension plans. He was speaking at a political meeting at the Empire Theatre last night as the opening guns were fired in the Liberal Party campaign in the by-election to be held in Queens County June 25.

Mr. Winters also stated it was hoped machinery can be set in motion in January to offer aid to needy people in the 65 to 69 age group. He said it takes time to get legislation through and that was the reason Prime Minister St. Laurent had called a fall session. The speaker said he had always felt this old age pension plan at age 70 had to come at the earliest possible date, which was when the people could afford it. He had thought it unfair that a means test should be required.

Mr. Winters was supporting the candidacy of Mr. Cecil Miller, Liberal Party standard bearer in the campaign for the seat made vacant by the death of the late Mr. J. Lester Douglas to whom he paid high tribute. He said Mr. Douglas was, esteemed, respected and greatly missed.

He referred to recent remarks attributed to Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, Progressive Conservative party member in the Commons, regarding his reasons for coming to the Province at this time. "Let's have no misunderstanding," he said, "I came here to address a political meeting and to help see that a Liberal candidate is returned in the election."

The Minister said he considered it an honor to be asked to support Mr. Miller, but added that he could understand Mr. McLure's reluctance to come here at this time. However, he added that undoubtedly Mr. McLure would be here for the election "but not from pride, just sense of duty."

In reviewing the work of the Liberal Party over the years he said some of the best legislation on the statute books of Canada was put there by the late MacKenzie King. Under the leadership of Mr. King Canada had grown from a small colonial nation to a great nation. He had always been successful in maintaining a solid balance between industrial growth and farm development.

Speaking about the Korean situation he said that Canada had been required to play a role far greater in importance than its size would warrant. He suggested that in order to have peace Canada must make herself strong in armament. But to do this, he said, some of our civilian activities must be curtailed.

"We have the potential to be one of the greatest countries of the future."

He complimented the local Liberal Party on its selection of Mr. Miller as its candidate and said he had been greatly impressed with his speaking ability and his sincerity.
