

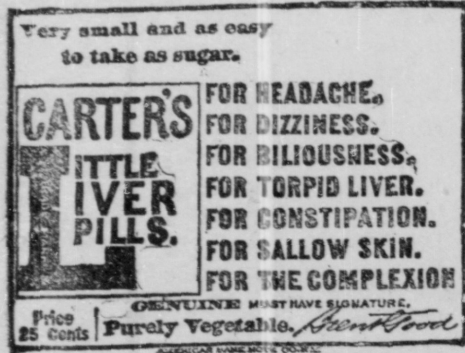

STEEL BRIDGES.

If steel bridges are to be built, they ought to be well built. There ought not to be constant expenditure on account of repairs. These steel bridges cost a lot of money, which Premier Farquharson euphonicly says is "drawn from capital," but which, in plain truth, is borrowed and added to the already great public debt upon which the taxpayers are compelled to pay interest. When to the interest is added the cost of repairs after every storm, the taxpayers are in a bad way as to steel bridges.

And this is already the case in regard to the bridge erected last year with a great flourish of trumpets. Reliable advices from Crapaud state that one of the creosoted piles upon which the bridge depends floated out to sea, after the last storm; that Mr. Archibald Lord was paid five dollars to find it; that it was "put in place by the Farquharson syndicate," and "that instead of being driven down by the heavy iron pile-driver used in the construction it was driven down by a wooden one which two men could easily lift." Then "Mr. Duncan McLean's schooner was chartered to bring a load of stone from Nova Scotia, and this stone was dumped around the piles in the hope that they will in the future be kept in place." This is the record of the present year in regard to a job badly done last year. What the record of the future years will be no one knows exactly—but the inference is clear that the steel bridge will be a "continual bill of expense."

This is a matter which effects all taxpayers. The people about Crapaud particularly must feel indignant when they see a public work which they were told would be permanent already beginning to go to pieces. Why was not this steel bridge placed upon stone piers and not upon creosoted wooden sticks, which have not been properly put down?

Everyone would like to see permanent bridges and permanent ways of all kinds all over this Province—provided they can be supplied at reasonable expense. Permanency in respect to bridges and roads is much to be desired. Permanency is economical. But to pay the price for a permanent work and then to see it going to pieces before a year has passed away—this is exasperating.

ROAD REFORM.

It is promised by the Hon. Daniel Gordon, who speaks for the party of which he is the honoured leader, that if the Opposition should be given a majority by the people,— "A radical change will be made in the administration of the Public Works Department so that the money now misapplied shall be used for the purpose intended, and not for the benefit of private individuals, as is now the custom."

The reform thus definitely indicated is one the need of which every man who is not personally interested in "the machine," will admit. In recent years the money of the people has been outrageously misapplied. Votes for partisans of the Government, not good roads, was the object of those who expended the road money so liberally, and often so greatly in excess of the legislative grants. The present road system is rotten. A new and better road system is required.

THE PHILIPPINES.

The Philippines, for which twenty millions were paid to Spain, have so far been a white elephant on the hands of Uncle Sam. The people there won't give in any more than the Boers. They will, like the Boers, have to be conquered. The United States army, sixty thousand strong, has not yet made much progress in this direction. Thousands of splendid men have fallen victims of Philippine bullets and Philippino disease. But little headway has been gained since Dewey left the place. At some points advantages have been obtained, only to be lost again when new efforts are made in other directions. Altogether the Philippine situation is not satisfactory to the United States Government and people. It is evident that more men will have to be sent out and more money spent there. But having gone into the business, the American people are evidently determined not to back out. There's too much of John Bull in them for that.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

LORD ROBERTS is accused of being too lenient by the British Press and by ex-President Kruger of being "savage" in his methods.

The two candidates for whom the seats were stolen have served out their time, and the party have got all the benefit out of the theft that was to be had, and now the proceedings might be expected to go on. The public money must at all events be expended upon the commissions.
