1960 Lobster Carnival Slated For July 20-23

Tentative dates for the 1960 Summerside Lobster Carnival were set for July 20 to 23 inclusive at a meeting of representatives of the various service clubs, Carnival Director Charles Hogan and Chairman Roy Johnston last evening in the RCAF Association club rooms.

Mr. Johnston asked each representative to express his opinion on whether a carnival should be held in 1960, although it was apparent there was no idea in mind of dropping it, and all were unanimous that the carnival be continued.

Such expressions of unanimity as the following were heard: "The last carnival was a real success!" "There was never any doubt in my mind but what there was going to be a 1960 lobster carnival!" "Excellent promotional scheme for the town!" "I think it's a great success whether it's a financial success or not!" It was explained by the chair-

Director Charles Hogan stated he would like the committees to get their new ideas in to the meetings as soon as possible. He said he felt the carnival is a big tourist attraction and that it achieved its real purpose, this past summer, for the first time since it was started four years ago.

New Royal Bank Building Is Business Area Addition

The new building of the Royal Bank of Canada being opened today gives Charlottetown's business district a face lifting.

The status of The Royal Bank of Canada's Charlottetown Branch has not changed and there has been no departure from traditionally sound banking procedures, but the Royal's customers, making use of the new facilities at the corner of Queen and Richmond Streets may have the feeling of being just a step ahead of the rest of the world.

3-IN-ONE
Faced with problems of space and the need to provide for future growth in the bank's business, ingenuity has enlarged upon what could have been a cramped location. Not the last of the innovations is the bank's "three-in-one" floor plan. There is a lower level to house the Savings, safe deposit and safekeeping departments.

The upper level accommodates the main banking floor and above this is a mezzanine floor where a number of the accounting and other "bank work" functions are carried on. In addition to these three "banking" levels the building has another floor which, for the time being, is to be let to tenants. An elevator provides transportation between all floor levels.

The exterior of the branch, fronting on Queen Street, is finished in grey granite, the base of the bank's polished granite. An imposing entrance and large areas of gleaming glass windows serve to enhance the general appearance from the outside.

SHADOWLESS
A great deal of planning has obviously gone into the designing of the bank's spacious interior. The system of lighting is particu-

larly intriguing. It is done by means of a "luminous" ceiling, made up of fluorescent lights set behind a "light diffuser". The effect is to spread a natural, shadowless light throughout the entire office, making it easy on the eyes for both customers and staff.

Prospective burglars will be disappointed to learn that while there is a most effective alarm system, details of its construction are kept secret. Likewise they will be unable to find out the weight of the vault door which might give them a clue as to its construction. The ponderous door leads to the customers' safe deposit vault on the lower floor level and is designed to withstand rust as well as burglars. Every exposed surface is of stainless steel which is expected to look as handsome as it does now for many years.

All banking floors are bright and airy, with acoustically-treated ceilings and interior decor in the modern manner, featuring soft pastel shades and matching furniture and fixtures. The handsome counters are of the smart "low-line" type with traditional cage "grills" conspicuous by their absence.
