# Cash Infusion Said Needed For Old Age Security Fund

OTTAWA (CP)—Health minister Monteth has indicated that the old age security fund soon will need a transfusion of cash to carry the load of an increase in the universal old age pension. However, he declined to tell the Senate banking committee just where the extra money will come from. That he said, is a budget matter and Finance Minister Fleming's responsibility.

Mr. Monteth appeared as the committee examined four government welfare measures—one increasing the old age pension to \$65 a month from \$55 for all

BOSTON (AP)—A liquor concern couldn't even give away its supply of more than 3,000 bottles of rye whisky and bourbon — so every bottle was emptied down the drain.

The Sidney B. Flashman Company, distillers and liquor brokers, had to get rid of the liquor because it is moving from Scollay Square. The old building is coming down to make way for construction of a government centre.

The liquors were samples for tasting. Because no tax is required on such bottles the company could neither sell nor give it away under the law.

The company solved the problem by dumping all the contents in a sink while a policeman stood by.

# CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

**WEST**

The bidding:  
 South West North East  
 1 ♠ Pass 2 ♠ Pass  
 4 NT Pass 5 ♠ Pass  
 6 ♠

Opening lead—Jack of clubs. Point count is often used to help determine whether a slam should be bid. Here is a hand that shows how it is done.

South bids a spade and North jumps to three spades. South knows the jump raise is ordinarily made with 13 to 15 points, and he therefore tentatively assumes that his side has a total of at least 33 points, the magic number for a slam.

However, responder's values

may not consist of high-card points only. He will sometimes have distributional features that are the equivalent of high-card points. Thus, he may have 11 high-card points and yet have a sound jump raise because of a void or singleton and good trump support.

So South uses Blackwood to check on the ace situation. When North responds five hearts, showing two aces, South bids the slam because he has adequate intermediate strength to justify it even though an ace is lacking.

The contract is certainly sound and would seldom be defeated, but it failed in this case because of a clever falsecard by the defense. West led a club and East took the ace and returned a club.

Declarer won it with the king and led the king of spades. On the spade East played the nine! South had previously planned to continue with a low spade to the ace to cover the possibility of East's having been dealt the J-9-x-x of spades, but when East played the nine, South had to consider the possibility that the nine was a singleton.

In that event, it would mean that West had started with the J-4-4-3 of spades. Leading a low spade to the ace would then lose the contract, so South, on this reasoning, played the queen of spades. When West showed out, South had to go down one.

If East had not falsecarded, declarer would surely have made the hand. South's only possible protection against a 4-1 break would have been to lead a low spade to the ace, and the cat would then have been out of the bag.
