

# Vacant House Is Destroyed

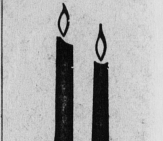
ALBERTON — A vacant house on the Wells-Orbison Road near Elmwood, owned by Hilton Barrett, was destroyed by fire early Saturday evening.

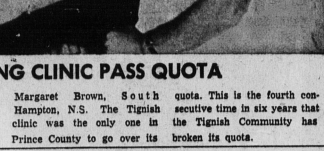

# 15 Lifeguards Scheduled At Nat. Park

With the coming of summer, thousands of people will soon flock to the beaches of the Edward Islands national park and the National Park Lifeguard service will again be on the beaches to render its valuable service.

Last year, a total of 10 rescues were successfully made by the lifeguard service. The lifeguard service members are fully trained under the Red Cross first aid and lifesaving service.

Most of the accidents which occur in the parks involve children from five to 14. The lifeguards are required to do much first aid treatment as over 100 minor accident cases were handled last year.

Last year life saving demonstrations were held at the beaches and will be again held this year. There will also be several swimming instruction classes and these helped in part to lessen the number of accidents.

This year the lifeguard service will be trained by the Red Cross and will take up posts in the national parks.
