In reply to a second question from CBS, Ho said peace could return to Viet Nam if the United States stopped its aggression and withdrew its troops, the CBS spokesman said. Ho has made similar statements in the past.

## Appears On Fraud Charge

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP) — Dieter Van Vorop, 25, will appear in court Aug. 17 on a charge of using the mails to defraud. About 12,000 invoices had been sent out to Canadian and United States companies offering registration of their products in an international trade directory for a \$14.75 fee.

Van Vorop, who arrived here from Germany in February, was arrested in Preston. He appeared in court before noon but the case was adjourned because he requested an interpreter before the charge was read. The remand was given and the case resumed in the afternoon.

Van Vorop was released on \$300 cash or \$1,000 property bail. Police seized cheques totaling \$1,253.75 and 1,200 replies from a post office box Tuesday. About 10 Windsor, Ont. firms are reported to have received the forms which carried the Canadian coat of arms and a legend that suggested it was from a government department.

Printed in French and English, the document carried an illegible signature intended to appear that of a trade department official.

## Fascinating Area Found For Artist

TORONTO (CP) — "A tremendous, fascinating new field for the artist" is Canadian painter John Gould's description of work with sketches filmed to sound effects. Gould has produced a 15-minute film employing 150 sketches from among 300 he made last summer in Mexico.

Called "Little Mexico," the film recreates a day in the life of a peaceful Mexican town, with scenes of the market place of old men dozing in the sun, and of a fiesta. "I couldn't have made a greater change if I had suddenly turned from painting to sculpture," Gould said in an interview. "I got the idea when Alan Jarvis did a show on my work from Spain on television a few years ago. It was a voice-over thing with Jarvis talking. I was immediately excited at how well drawings reproduce and what sense of movement the camera can give to them." So last summer I went to Oaxaca and Guanajuato, in the central region of Mexico. For a month I used my sketch-pad like a reporter, looking for the life and movement and flow of events in the towns, day after day.

The effect of the new medium is a product of the sketches that flow into one another, the background sounds that blend with the drawings, and the skilled use of camera that glides over different features of the sketches.

## Charge Members Aggression Tool

TOKYO (AP) — Pro-Communist Laotians were quoted Sunday as charging that Canadian and Indian members of the international Control Commission have turned the commission into a tool of U.S. aggression against Laos. They were said to have demanded it be dissolved.

The neo-Communist Pathet Lao also were reported to have asked the Soviet Union, China, France and other members of the 1962 Geneva conference to "compel" the United States to respect Laotian neutrality.

Peking's official New China news agency said Pathet Lao radio demanded that the three-country commission "cease all its activities." Poland is the third member. The commission was created by the 1954 and 1962 Geneva conferences on the former French Indochina.

The Pathet Lao were said to have claimed Canada and India had "joined the United States in violating the Geneva agreements and in systematically helping the aggression of the U.S. war of aggression against Laos."

"They (Canada and India) misrepresented the truth about Laos, shielded the U.S. acts of aggression, infringed on the sovereignty of Laos and the principle of unanimity of the three political forces of Laos and undermined the working principle of the international commission."

The despicable actions of the Indian and Canadian members had turned the international commission into a tool serving the U.S. policy of intervention and aggression against Laos.

## EYES IN DEMAND

TORONTO (CP) — Canada's eye bank, a joint undertaking of the University of Toronto and the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, is empty. Mrs. Anne Wolf, the bank's executive secretary, says that more than 30,000 Canadians have pledged their eyes to the bank when they die, but most of them are young and the bank will not benefit for years.

## Festival Activity Approaching Peak

Tourists are jamming Prince Edward Island these days, and many of them seem to come to the Charlottetown Summer Festival where with three weeks gone and the newest and biggest production, "The Adventures of Private Turvey", on the verge of opening, activity at the Festival is reaching a frantic peak. Confederation Centre reached its all-time high attendance record last Wednesday when 6,000 people used its facilities. Guides who take a count of the building's visitors gave the day's figures at 4,708, the art gallery registered 1,274. The Canadian Puppet Theatre staged two sell-out shows in the afternoon. The Ladies of the Provinces Confederation Parade, a historical fashion pageant, played in an overflow house. Anne of Green Gables was sold out, and in the Festival Cabaret Club there was standing room only for The Village Revue, a series of sketches by Don Cullen, Don Ewer, Diane Dewby and Jane Casson. The day was a peak, but the pattern is a consistent one. In the arts complex termed a potential white elephant when it opened in 1964, the art gallery, now showing "The Royal Canadian Academy in Retrospect", has been averaging 800-1,000 visitors a day all July. Anne of Green Gables, after an opening night of seats-in-the-aisles, has settled down to a steady 80-90 per cent house. (The theatre seats 946. This year's new comedy, "The Ottawa Man", facing tough competition from "Anne", has fared less well, but houses are building steadily, and theatre officials are optimistic about the second half of the season for it.

## Claim Ho Says No Trial In View

NEW YORK (AP) — The Columbia Broadcasting System said it received Sunday a cable signed by North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh saying "no trial in view" in answer to a CBS query whether he has decided to place captive U.S. airmen on trial. CBS said it sent a cable to Ho last Thursday asking him: "Would you kindly advise us so that we may in turn advise the people of America whether you have decided as yet to place on trial the captive American airmen?" The CBS report came after Hanoi radio said a North Vietnamese committee to investigate U.S. war crimes in Viet Nam had appealed for help from abroad to build up a case against what it called the ferocious acts of Americans in the Viet Nam war.
