A TERRIBLY fatal epidemic of fever is raging at Unrisht, in the Punjab, the daily mortality being from two to three hundred. During the eleven days ending on the 1st inst., 2,265 deaths occurred, 1,138 victims being children.

Professor Macoun reports the land about Fort Pelly to be the best in the North-West. It is an undulating prairie, exceedingly fertile and easy of drainage. The other item is that an easy means of increasing the outflow from Lake Manitoba has been ascertained, which will prevent the encroachment of the water upon the land.—Mail.

MR. HERBERT GLADSTONE, young politician as he is, goes to Ireland for a more definite purpose than that of merely visiting the Chief Secretary, viz., to study the system of Irish Government with a view to taking a share in it himself at no very distant date.

REV. DR. MCGREGOR, who accompanied the Governor General on his recent tour of the North West, and whose letters to the Scotsman created such favorable comment, arrived at Halifax on Thursday, and will remain a few days in the city. He speaks highly of the North West and predicts for it a great future.

THE NEW British Minister to the United States, who will not arrive for a few weeks yet, is a widower. Washington society is agreeably moved by the announcement that his sister-in-law, Mrs. Cornwallis West, who shared with Mrs. Langtry the homage paid to beauty by London society, is to reside for him at the British Legation.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

PARNELL ARRESTED.

EXCITEMENT AMONG THE LAND LEAGUERS—MR. GLADSTONE ON THE SITUATION—MESSAGES FROM SECRETARY QUINN.

DUBLIN, Oct. 13.

Charles S. Parnell was arrested this morning at Kingsbridge Railway station, on his way to attend the Kildare Convention. It is not known with what offence he is charged.

New York, Oct. 13.

A later account from Dublin represents that Mr. Parnell, the Irish leader, was arrested by Detective Supt. Mallins at Morrison's Hotel on two warrants, signed by Forster, Secretary for Ireland, charging him with inciting the people to intimidate others from paying their rent, and with intimidating tenants from taking the benefit of the Land Act.

Mr. Parnell was taken to Kilmzinham jail in a cab.

The action of the Government produced intense excitement throughout Ireland when the event became known, and it excited great interest in England as well.

LONDON, Oct. 13.

It is understood that the determination to arrest Parnell was only reached at yesterday's Cabinet Council. The warrant was issued to the detectives of Dublin on the arrival there of Mr. Forster, who left London immediately after the close of the Cabinet Council.

The Times says it "understood the Cabinet separated yesterday without coming to any decision in regard to the course to be pursued in Ireland, but that the Cabinet will meet again soon and the decision cannot be long postponed. There are no doubt two parties in the Cabinet, but the ministers must seriously reflect that the impatience of the country grows daily at the continued spectacle of authority in Ireland being flouted and law defied."

New York, Oct. 13.

The following official despatch was received by Patrick Ford, editor of the Irish World, this morning:—

DUBLIN, Oct. 13—11.10 a. m.

Parnell was arrested in bed in Morrison's Hotel at 35 minutes past nine o'clock this morning and immediately lodged in Kilmzinham Jail, under the escort of Supt. Malline, Chief of the Detective Bureau. Ireland is in a ferment and Dublin in a state of terrible excitement. The city is an armed camp, showing the arrest has been premeditated and the troops prepared for action. No event in the history of Ireland has so stirred Dublin, and the only parallel is Paris at the destruction of the Bastille.

DUBLIN, Oct. 13—noon.

The condition of things at this hour is awful. The wave of indignation gathers force as moments fly, and there is no telling what it may betoken or what the consequence may be.

Parnell was resting preparatory to proceeding to attend the convention of the Land and Labor League of County Kildare when he was surrounded and hurried off to the dungeon. The Land League Executive is at this moment sitting, with John Dillon in the chair. The worst is being prepared for. It is rumored the government will take military possession of the Land League headquarters and proceed to the utmost extremity of brute force to repress the organization. Calm but deliberate and decisive action can be looked for from the men at the head. If the men in America stand firmly by us there need be no fears of the ultimate result.

LONDON, Oct. 13.

Mr. Gladstone, speaking at Guild Hall, to-day, deplored the arrears of business in the House of Commons in consequence of the disloyalty to the House of men who had no pride in its transactions. When Parliament has been rendered efficient, he said, a reform in the London municipality will be undertaken.

In announcing the arrest of Parnell he said: "I have been informed that the first step has been taken towards the vindication of law and order of rights of property, and of the first elements of civilization, by the arrest of a man who, entirely from motives which I do not challenge or examine, has made himself prominent in the attempt to destroy the authority of the law. We are not at issue with the people of Ireland, and I firmly believe that the majority of the tenants earnestly desire a fair trial of the Land Act."

Mr. Gladstone said he would rejoice at the adoption of any form of government in Ireland provided it did not impair the supremacy of the Imperial Government.

LONDON, Oct. 13.

The Secretary of the Land League was interviewed shortly after Parnell's arrest to-day. He expressed much astonishment, exclaiming excitedly: "Let them come on; we are ready for them."

Father Sheehy, Patrick Egan and V. B. Dillon proceeded to Paris to-day.

BOSTON, Oct. 13.

P. A. Collins, President of the Land League of the United States, sent the following cablegram to the executive in Dublin to-day:—

To Secretary Land League, Dublin:—

Parnell's arrest is Gladstone's blunder. Parnell in prison must be the strongest force of the League. Continue his policy. Stand firm and keep cool. The British game has always been to crush agitation in Ireland by provoking civil war. Defeat it. Keep on in the old lines. Be patient as you have been bold. The American League will redouble its work and stand by you to the end.

DUBLIN, Oct. 13.

An additional guard and two nine-pounders have been stationed in the upper castle yard.

A meeting of the citizens of Dublin has been summoned for Friday, to express indignation at the arrest of Parnell. Dillon will preside.

At a meeting of the Land League Executive, Dillon said it was the most trying and critical moment that had occurred in their history during the past century. He said the statement that Parnell had intimidated the people was false. He (Dillon) defied anybody to point to a single speech of Parnell's in favor of intimidation. His arrest was due to private malice. It was the duty of the nation to deal with the matter coolly and with judgment, and to maintain the struggle within the law.

The Cork Branch of the Land League has passed a resolution denouncing the Government.
