

Canada Leading International Urge To Escape From Cold War

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada is stirring things up on a wide international front to try to take advantage of what officials see as an almost worldwide restlessness for escape from the confines of the cold war.

External Affairs Minister Martin said in a speech last week that Canada is not a neutral country. He said that the attitude of Western Europe to American commitments in Europe is changing; just as the attitude of Eastern Europe toward Moscow is changing.

Mr. Martin has been urging improved relations between NATO and its counterpart in Eastern Europe, the Warsaw Pact, as a prerequisite for reaching a settlement of the German and Berlin problems.

An informed view is that Communist Romania is showing the way to dissolution of the Warsaw Pact just as France's actions may lead to disintegration of NATO.

Sources close to the cabinet said some ministers are beginning to question seriously an annual Canadian outlay of \$1,570,000,000 for defence and are critical of the planned construction in 1966-72 of a multi-million-dollar, 38-storey defence headquarters.

These sources also said some ministers would like to see at least a partial withdrawal of Canadian forces from Europe. A group of Conservatives is openly advocating this.

MAY RETURN TROOPS
One source said that the Canadian government might bring some Canadian troops home soon and cut defence expenditures if it were not for the fear of American economic retaliation.

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He said at another point: "It would be short-sighted not to realize that the attitude of Western Europe to American commitments in Europe is changing; just as the attitude of Eastern Europe toward Moscow is changing."

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Seven Days Members Seek Jobs In U.S.

TORONTO (CP)—Douglas Lettermann, executive producer of the CBC TV program This Hour Has Seven Days, says key members of the program's staff are seeking jobs outside the CBC some of them in the United States.

Four-month contracts offered to his senior personnel are "a slap in the face," Mr. Lettermann said in an interview.

Co-hosts Patrick Watson and Laurier LaPierre have been fired from the controversial public affairs program and senior management has decided not to extend Seven Days contracts beyond September.

At least one Seven Days producer-director, Peter Pearson, has already left to join the National Film Board, said Mr. Lettermann. A second, Jim Carney, may follow him.

MAY HELP ALCOHOLICS
WATERLOO, Ont. (CP)—Dr. J. G. Fraser, clinical director of Toronto's Addiction Research Foundation, says a new antibiotic drug still being tested may have a side-effect of reducing or eliminating an alcoholic's desire to drink the drug, metronidazole, used in the treatment of the venereal disease, trachoma, has tempered the desire for drinking of some alcoholic patients, he says.

POWER NOT SHARED
Mr. Pearson also said: "An alliance for defence only is an anachronism in 1966, especially when nuclear power is not shared, by possession or control, among its members."

Canada has also been conducting "discreet probes" as a member of the International Atomic Energy Commission in Viet Nam to examine any and all leads bearing on possible moves toward negotiations.

Informants said a new Geneva conference appears the only adequate framework for Viet Nam negotiations. It was the 1964 Geneva meeting which ended the civil war between the French and Vietnamese and established the truce commission.

U.S. Insurance Sold In Canada
OTTAWA (CP)—The Commonsense finance committee has been told less than one quarter of fire and casualty insurance policies issued in Canada are issued Canadian-owned or controlled companies.

Richard Humphries, federal insurance department superintendent, said Canadian policies issue 22 to 23 per cent of these policies. There had been little change in the last 10 years.

His statement came during questioning by Ron Barford (L-Vancouver Burrard) and George Valade (PC-Montreal Ste. Marie) about ownership of U.S. insurance companies with subsidiaries in Canada.

"Harder and harder questions will be asked" of U.S. companies applying to incorporate subsidiaries in Canada, Mr. Barford said. There was "increasing concern about the degree of Canadianization of Canadian companies."

American subsidiaries "are almost arms of U.S. foreign policy," he said.

The committee approved Senate bills incorporating the new Aetna Casualty Company of Canada, which is American-owned, and the Century Insurance Company (formerly Pacific Coast Fire Insurance Company), the General Mortgage Corporation of Canada, the Income Life Insurance Company of Canada and the Income Disability and Reinsurance Company of Canada, all Canadian-owned.

FRANCE STILL IN OTTAWA
OTTAWA (CP)—France has given no indication that it intends to withdraw from participation in Expo 67 because of construction difficulties created by the Quebec longshoremen's strike. Trade Minister Winters said Friday in the Commonsense Replying to Albert Hamilton (PC-Quebec) who referred to "widespread panic" among countries building pavilions at Expo. Mr. Winters said there is no panic and France has given no indication of withdrawing.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

BIDDING QUIZ
You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

West North East South
1♥ 1♠ 2♣ 2♦

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?

- ♠782 ♠A6 ♠782 ♠742
- ♠KJ645 ♠7 ♠A95 ♠9682
- ♠KT ♠K92 ♠Q7 ♠QJ853
- ♠Q832 ♠KJ64 ♠A78

1. One spade. It may be argued that this is not a biddable suit, but, since the responder acts under the compulsion of the double, he is not responsible for the texture of the suit he bids. The doubler is supposed to bid delicately over a forced response until such time as responder voluntarily makes a forward-going bid.

It is better to bid one spade than one notrump. The latter response is reserved for hands that contain 7, 8 or 9 high-card points and a stopper in the adverse suit.

2. Two spades. In responding to a double, care must be taken to distinguish a good hand from a poor one. Since the responder may have a worthless hand when he replies to the double, he is under obligation to identify a good one when he has
