Italian Premier Segni Announces New Cabinet

ROME (Reuters)—Antonio Segni, Italy's new Christian Democratic premier, Wednesday announced the makeup of a coalition cabinet to continue the country's pro-Western foreign policy. Nine posts are unchanged in the cabinet—which contains 14 members of the Christian Democratic (Catholic) party, four Social Democrats and three Liberals. It has a majority—on paper—of only four in the 590-member Chamber of Deputies and faces a precarious existence. Continuing in the posts they held under former premier Mario Scelba are such key men as Foreign Minister Gaetano Martino, Budget Minister Ezio Vanoni, Defence Minister Paolo Emilio Taviani and Treasury Minister Silvio Gava. The vice-premiership, held by Giuseppe Saragat, also is unchanged. Wednesday night Segni, 64-year-old Sardinian scholar and lawyer, led his 21 ministers to the Quirinal Palace, residence of President Giovanni Gronchi, where they were sworn in.

PRO-WESTERN OUTLOOK The executive committee of the three coalition parties, plus the small Republican party which has pledged its support in Parliament, have agreed that the new government shall maintain Italy's support of Western foreign policy and all feasible moves for reaching East-West tension. The committee also agreed to try to stimulate Italy's trade with Iron Curtain countries. But the Liberal party, which represents big industry and the landowners, obtained from the Christian Democrat executive committee stringent guarantees against Segni's known zeal for land reform and other socially progressive policies. First test for the cabinet, formed after two weeks of bargaining, will come next Wednesday when the premier formally presents it to Parliament for a vote of confidence.

PERSONAL TRIUMPH Launching of the new cabinet is a personal triumph for Amintore Fanfani, dynamic 47-year-old executive secretary of the Christian Democratic party, and its effective leader. His moves to bolster the new premier's cabinet - making efforts were believed to be aimed at warding off any attempt by Gronchi to intervene directly in the crisis. Fanfani feared that failure to re-

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Canada Suffered Loss In British Dock Strike

MONTREAL (CP) — Spokesmen for leading shipping companies operating out of St. Lawrence river ports said Monday they doubt if it will ever be possible to make a reasonable assessment of losses resulting from the stewards' and dockers' strikes in Britain. They said it has been considerable. It would take some time—at least a month and probably longer—before cargoes piled up on British docks were sorted out and loaded for their original destinations. Canadian Pacific Steamships reported that holds on two of its ships have contained the same cargo for six weeks—the whole length of the tie-up.

A spokesman for Cunard lines said 10 one-way voyages—or five round trips—have been missed by passenger liners scheduled for runs to Montreal and Quebec from British ports. In addition to loss of shipping revenues, officials listed overtime for crews strikebound in ports, accommodation for stranded passengers and docking costs as items which ran the loss to acute proportions. No estimate was available on how the grain trade was affected by the strikes. They said they countered any difficulties by directing mail to ports where it could be unloaded and trans-shipped.
