

Australia Relaxes Restrictions On Non-Dollar Goods

CANBERRA, (AP)—Australia relaxed restrictions Friday on a wide range of non-dollar imports. The cabinet also made decisions aimed at making trade easier with Japan, acting Prime Minister Sir Arthur Fadden announced. The import relaxations, he said, will amount to increasing by 10 per cent quotas of various imports from non-dollar and non-Japanese sources. The decision is a further step in the progressive relaxation of the import controls imposed last year, Fadden said.
