Avro Changes Name Of Company in Canada

TORONTO (CP)—Change in the name of A. V. Roe Canada Ltd. to Hawker Siddeley Canada Ltd. was approved unanimously at the company's annual meeting.
T. J. Emmert, president, in outlining reasons for the change, said the company in the next five years aims at \$175,000,000 to \$200,000,000 in new export business, or double the value of exports in the last five years. The Hawker Siddeley group, he stated, has a world-wide organization with annual sales of \$1,000,000,000 and the change would enable the Canadian company to capitalize on the Hawker Siddeley name.
Along with the increased export program, Mr. Emmert said new products must be found and funds invested in their design and production. Several programs of a major nature now are under study.

Last Major Election Plank Is Nailed By Liberal Party

OTTAWA (CP)—A flexible defence policy ruling out nuclear weapons for Canada "on the basis of present information" was announced here by the Liberal Party.
It was the last major election plank nailed down by the Liberals, who through public speeches by leader Pearson and distribution of policy statements over the past several months have spelled out the party's position in other fields.
While stressing the need for strengthening conventional forces and limiting the spread of the nuclear club, the policy statement leaves several avenues open for a change of policy in the future.
It starts with these words: Defence policy cannot be fixed for all time. Decisions must be made in the light of changing circumstances as they become known.
A new Liberal government will not hesitate to adapt its defence policy to changing conditions.

Bank Directors To Meet In N.S.

MONTREAL (CP)—The directors of the Royal Bank of Canada will hold a full board meeting in Halifax for the first time in 55 years on Friday, May 4, it was announced here.
The meeting, in the board and senate room of Dalhousie University, continues the bank's recently-adopted policy of holding board meetings in principal Canadian cities to enable the directors to become more familiar with local conditions across the country.

ernment is refusing to install warheads.
The statement does not say what would be done by a Liberal government about Bomarc missiles already acquired and Bomarc bases already built except to say it "will prevent such costly hesitation and waste."
The statement also makes no reference to a defence matter raised by Mr. Pearson in a Quebec City speech Nov. 6.
In that speech Mr. Pearson said a Liberal government would give consideration to allowing American troops to have control over nuclear weapons in Canada if the U.S. government proved such an American base in Canada was "absolutely essential." He said he would not regard that as an extension of the nuclear club so long as the weapons remained under American control.
He said the increase in sales was chiefly due to increased shipments of paper manufactured in the company's Madawaska mills as compared with the first quarter of 1961 when the general slowdown of business activity resulted in a considerably lower level of operations. Lumber shipments were also greater than for the same period last year.
Operations of all divisions were maintained at improved levels over the corresponding period last year with the exception of the paperboard mill at Edmundston and the unbleached kraft mill at Newcastle, N.B.

Fraser Companies Profits Increase

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP)—Fraser Companies Ltd. had net profit in the first quarter of 1962 of \$883,687 or 40 cents a share compared with \$345,187 and 15 cents in the corresponding period last year.
Sales were \$14,154,257 compared with \$12,566,363.
Anthony Crabtree, president, said conversion of United States funds into Canadian funds during the first quarter contributed \$341,390 to earnings before provision for taxes compared with an exchange loss of \$85,324 in the same period in 1961.
