PM Reveals Party Assists With Salary Of Secretary

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson said Wednesday that the supplement to his press secretary's salary is paid by "a party source."

"As far as I know that has been so all the time I have been prime minister and before that," he told reporters following a cabinet meeting.

Mr. Pearson was asked to identify the sources of income of Richard O'Hagan, his press secretary since his days as opposition leader.

Mr. O'Hagan receives \$10,000 a year from the government plus an undisclosed additional amount. There had been efforts by reporters to determine whether the supplement came from the Liberal party or private individuals or groups.

Shortly after Mr. Pearson told reporters the supplement comes from a party source, his office called reporters to say Mr. Pearson had intended to use the words "the party" rather than "a party source."

Ire Of Defense Officials Aroused By CF-5 Criticism

OTTAWA (CP)—Senior defence department officials, their ire aroused by criticism of Canada's new tactical aircraft, are launching a major "sell-the-

CF-5" effort within the services, informants said here.

The campaign includes a special preview of the aircraft at air force bases across the country and an intensive propaganda-briefing drive among military personnel.

The preview will begin later this month when a group of CF-5s, to be shown the public at Toronto's Canadian National Exhibition, will first be diverted to RCAF bases for a series of special demonstrations.

The accent, informants said, will be on selling the CF-5 to the "comers" at the squadron leader-flight lieutenant level at which recent publicly-expressed doubts about the plane appear to have made some impact.

"We're convinced that, once our people really see this plane and know the facts about it, any doubts will disappear," said one high-placed source. "This aircraft really can sell itself."

ACIDITY UNEXPECTED—The semi-unofficial campaign-defence department spokesmen are reluctant to confirm any special bid is being made as a direct attempt by Defence Minister Hellyer and other top CF-5 boosters to counter the unexpectedly biting flow of criticism which followed official selection of the Northrop plane as Canada's new tactical aircraft.

"The fact is that an overwhelming majority within both the air force and the department approve of this choice," said one informant. "The noise that's being made about it just isn't justified."

The CF-5 supporters maintain that the main criticism of the plane comes from "a handful of 'big war' exponents" who are opposed to Canadian purchase of any aircraft which does not have a nuclear-bombing capability.

Baffin Island Doctor Thinks Job May Go Over Comments

FROBISHER BAY (CP)—Dr. Sylvester Drabbit said here he is afraid other civil servants in the North might "clam up" because of the fuss about remarks he made before the advisory commission on the development of government in the Northwest Territories.

Dr. Drabbit, on staff at the federal government hospital in this Baffin Island community for the last three years, believes he might lose his job because of press reports of his presentation to the commission.

In a 40-minute appearance before the commission Saturday night, Dr. Drabbit made an impassioned plea for more consultation between the federal government and the Eskimos.

He spoke of what he called mistakes government departments were making in the north and referred to Health Minister Judy LaMarsh as a "dough-head."

Since then he has heard that his superiors in Ottawa will want a full report of what he told the commission. He also has received a phone call from Gene Rheume, Conservative MP for the Territories, informing him his job may be in jeopardy.

NEED FRANK TALK—Dr. Drabbit, who took up medical studies at age 30 so that he could minister to the Eskimos, said it was most important that civil servants in the North speak frankly to the commission.

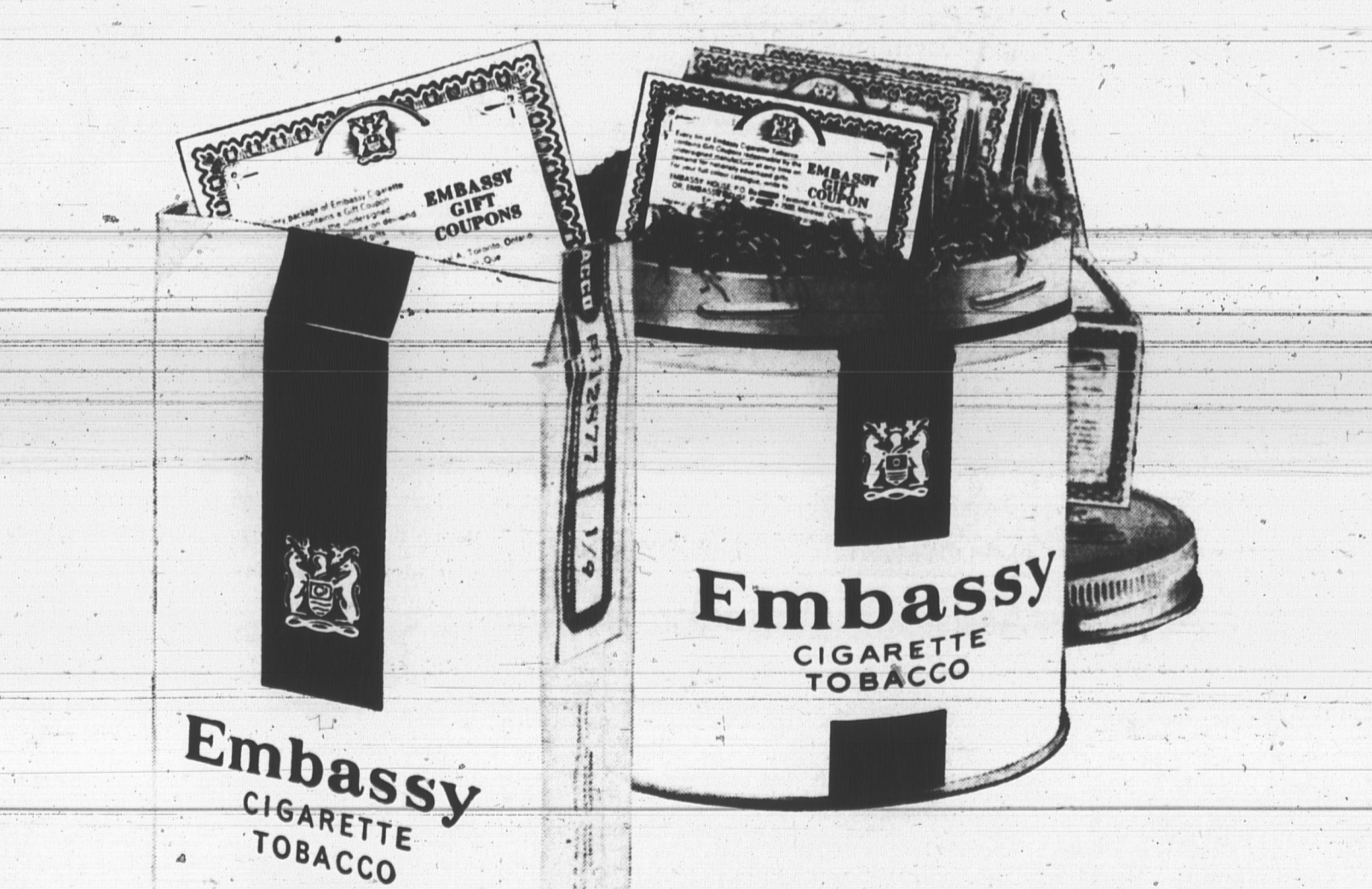
Birch found himself sitting down to tea with the Royal family in the course of a visit by the Queen to the aircraft carrier Centaur in the Clyde River.
