Mrs. Muriel MacInnis, Borden, was appointed a delegate to the 13th National Convention to be held at the MacDonald Hotel, Edmonton, Alberta, on July 28-30. The book "J. S. Woodsworth—A Man To Remember," a biography of the late J. S. Woodsworth, founder of the C. C. F. party, written by his daughter, Mrs. Grace MacInnis, was reviewed and highly commended by Mr. J. W. Howe who reminded the meeting that Mrs. Grace MacInnis, the wife of a former Islander, Mrs. Angus MacInnis, M. P. A. native of Glen William, P. E. I., recently received the Governor General's Medal, the highest award for biography, at the University of British Columbia, for this work. Let's Talk It Over

According to a recent news despatch, Liberal partisans argue regarding Senate reform: "Why should Mr. St. Laurent break a tradition of generations simply because of the vast Liberal majority in the Senate? Well, we should certainly reverse some of our country's traditions, but this reverence can easily be misplaced or go too far. How could progress continue to advance the onward march of civilization if we didn't, when the occasion warranted it, break a 'tradition of generations'?" When the House of Commons was begun in England, a tradition of generations had to be broken. Every time the right to vote was extended, beyond the big landholders to the rest of our population until it finally reached the la-dies, it meant a rupture of one of these cherished traditions. The abolition of slavery meant that tradition had to take another beating, and don't think there were not many who rose up to deplore this taking liberties with the status quo. In fact, the broadening of freedom from one precedent to another is nothing more nor less than the breaking of time-honored traditions. We have, of course, many traditions of which we can feel proud, but others tend to outlive their usefulness, and for the cause of greater service to mankind, must go into the limbo of outdated institutions.
