THE BREAKWATER.—At the York joint meeting on Friday evening last, Mr. T. A. Maclean, Charlottetown, was one of the speakers, his remarks bearing specifically upon government contracts. "In the matter of the contract for the Summerside breakwater," according to THE EXAMINER'S report, "Mr. Maclean showed that previous to the election of Mr. Maclellan this contract had been let to Holman and McLeod, but after the election it was thrown up and the check was returned. Previous to Mr. Bell's election the same contract was once more let to Holman and Macleod, but after the election it was again thrown up and the check returned. Now the contract has been let again at a much larger figure and a similar course may be pursued. Mr. Maclean is credited with making the speech of the evening." Mr. Maclean has a good grasp of the facts of the matter, and he evidently showed them up in a light that reflects no credit on the government. The Liberals can no longer conjure up votes by means of the Summerside breakwater.—Summerside Journal.

McKINNON'S SLANDER AND HAZARD'S WILD STATEMENTS.

Mr. Hazard made some exceedingly wild statements regarding the tariff, for which he was called down by Mr. Martin. Mr. Hazard claimed that the duties had been reduced fifty per cent, whereupon Mr. Martin showed that many of the duties cited by him (Mr. Hazard) were increased and that others never were fifty per cent under either party.
