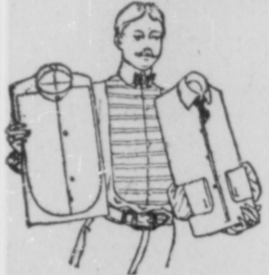

KROONSTADT TAKEN WITHOUT OPPOSITION

BRITISH CONTINUE TO PUSH THE BOERS.

There are Three Brigades Following Them Up.

Opposition in the Free State Practically Over—
Burghers Trekking Homeward—Heavy Fighting Reported in Natal—The Relief of Mafeking.

LONDON EXCITED.

LONDON, May 14.—Not since Ladysmith and Kimberley were relieved has London been in such a state of excitement as it was on Saturday night. "Kroonstadt taken and without opposition." The news came almost like a thunder clap.

PUSHING THE ENEMY AT EDEN.

EDEN, May 12 via Thaba N'Chu, May 13—General Buller is pushing the enemy back along a front of thirty miles.

The Boers, it is believed, are concentrating at Clocolau.

General Grenfell occupied Newburg's Mills this morning without opposition capturing many thousand bags of wheat flour. Four hundred Boers just escaped him.

Generals Boyes' Brabant's and Campbell's brigades are following up the enemy. A large quantity of rifle cartridges have been found on the farms.

REPORT FROM KROONSTADT.

KROONSTADT, May 14.—President Steyn has gone to Lindley, the new seat of the Free State Government.

A number of Burghers are trekking homeward. Opposition in the Free State is practically over.

All the prisoners in the hands of the British here agree that the quarrel between the Free Staters and the Transvaalers is so acute that the Transvaalers have decided to leave their allies whom they accuse of cowardice and lack of patriotism.

Most of the Transvaal prisoners think that if they are defeated at Vaal River the Boers will retreat to Pretoria.

But there appears to be growing distrust in their Transvaal Government.

In a word the back of the Boers resistance seems to have been broken. The Burghers are not fighting with their previous stubbornness. They seem ready to retreat on the slightest pretext.

The prisoners, even the Transvaalers, appear glad to have been captured. They say they are sick of the war, which can only have one ending.

Several have exclaimed: "We have lost our liberty but why should we lose our lives?"

President Steyn is reported as having been frantic with rage, as having kicked and cuffed burghers after vainly imploring them to continue the fight.

Lindley, the new Free State capital, is 45 miles southeast of Kroonstadt half way to Bethlehem.

FIGHTING IN NATAL.

LONDON, May 14.—The Standard publishes the following from Durban, dated Sunday: There are persistent rumors here of heavy fighting in Natal.

A Red Cross train left last night for the north.

ENEMY DISORGANIZED.

GENEVA SIDING, May 11.—The enemy is quite disorganized. At a meeting of the Free Staters it was decided that they

would surrender Kroonstadt, and abandon the war.

MAFEKING AGAIN.

LONDON, May 14.—A report that Mafeking was relieved reached London last night from an unofficial source. No official confirmation is at hand and the rumor may easily be premature.

To judge from the progress of the British relief force, as reported by the Boers, Mafeking should be reached by today or tomorrow or by Wednesday at latest.
