French Leaving Indochina Over Past Two Years

SAIGON (Reuters in the last two years, French colonial rule has been swept away in Indochina and thousands of French soldiers and civilians have been leaving for home. "For us there is no future here," they say.

But not one little army of elderly Frenchmen numbering two or three thousand. They are men who have cut their roots at home and replanted themselves on Indochinese soil. They are determined to stay.

These old Frenchmen have spent so many years of their lives carving a new prosperity out of the jungle and swamps here that their pride and patriotism have been largely transferred to Indochina. Many of them are married to local women, who would find life hard in France without the services they can afford here.

In Phnompenh, capital of the Indochinese state of Cambodia, a 70-year-old Frenchman explained why he feels this way.

FRANCE CHANGED

"I lived in France until I was 19," he said. "Then I came out here. At first I used to look forward to my leaves in France every four or five years. But, as time went by, France changed. I found that I was going back to a foreign country which grew more foreign every time I went there.

"So I have decided to live 'out' my life among the people I know here in Cambodia."

One of the most respected of the group is 78-year-old Henry Banyan, an agricultural expert from Tarbes in the Pyrenees, who was mayor of Saigon several times in colonial days. He arrived in Indochina in 1901 and has been home twice since.

When he came, Saigon was a marshy place with a few houses. He saw it turned, by hard work and careful administration, into a great port and a modern city.
