Funeral Services Held In S'side

SUMMERSIDE - Funeral services for the late Claude T. Kenny, Sr., retired deputy fire chief, was held yesterday at the Bonness Funeral Home at two o'clock.

Mr. Kenny died Tuesday in Prince County Hospital after a very brief illness. "Poppy", as he was affectionately called, was 88 years old.

The son of the late Peter Kenny and Emma (Lyle) Kenny, he was born in Summerside on January 12, 1878. He attended Summerside High School, then was employed by the late H.A. Compton, undertaker, and with W.A. Ching, confectionary and fruit store on Water Street.

He also worked for Canadian Express Company, and later with the Canadian National Express Company until his retirement.

A great lover of flowers, he worked in his garden up until his death. He was also interested in horseracing, baseball and hockey, and was the oldest living retired member of the Summerside Fire Department, having retired from the department when he was deputy fire chief.

His wife, the former Fannie Hunter Gould of Summerside predeceased him in 1932.

He is survived by two sons, Claude, Jr., Summerside, and Cyril, Summerside, and one daughter, Blanche Kenny, Toronto. Also surviving are two sisters, Elsie (Mrs. William MacQuarrie) and Lilian (Mrs. Oliver Carver), both of Summerside; six grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

He was also predeceased by a daughter in 1949 and a brother and sister.

Former Resident Dies In Florida

Neil Weston Higgins, son of the late Wallace L. Higgins, and Mrs. Higgins, city, died in Tampa, Florida, Oct. 17. He was 55.

A chartered accountant, Mr. Higgins held a bachelor of commerce degree from Dalhousie University, Halifax. He was a student of Prince of Wales College and West Kent School.

SUMMERSIDE - With the potato harvest about half-way through, the season has so far little in the way of unusual news. The crop, weather and prices all seem to be about average. Rain in recent days has hampered picking in the area, however.

Market possibilities, says Thane Ellis, local potato dealer, depend on the weather in the Maritimes and across the country in the next two weeks or so. He reports prices to the farmer are now \$1.10 per bag, contents only.

Blanche Hogg, employment branch supervisor of the Canada Manpower Centre here, reports that 245 potato pickers have been brought in by the local office, plus 88 laborers for the cole crops, such as brussels
