

Unholy. So those public meetings were exclusive of that tolerably large segment of the community who have not yet bowed the knee to the Baal of Toryism. Well, it is admitted that "the meetings were suggested by the Alliance—and that is all"—rather a cool admission to make after the previous contradictory statement; and in the next sentence it is denied, "that the members of the Alliance labored with might and main" to secure the return of their favorite candidates. But this honest confession is qualified by the veracious denial, that they did so labour "for the purpose of converting the City Government into an engine for political purposes."

We republish from the *Islander* of Friday last the following paragraph, as an excellent specimen of the kind of information with which the editor—buried in the bush at New London—is in the habit of entertaining his readers when writing on subjects connected with our political affairs, and as a proof how easily the old man may be imposed upon by every silly gossiping tale sent to him from Charlottetown. He has succeeded in this instance in stringing three falsehoods into just as many lines. Falsehood No. 1.—The Loan Bill has not yet received the Royal allowance. We entertain, however, no doubt that it will. Falsehood No. 2.—The Earl of Selkirk has not yet offered to sell his property to the Government. It is believed, however, that his Agent in this Colony is charged with some instructions on this subject, and will no doubt comply with them as soon as he learns that the Bill has received Her Majesty's assent. Falsehood No. 3 must be apparent to every one. As the Loan Bill has not passed, and as the Earl of Selkirk has not offered to sell—the British Government could not—even if the law allowed it—undertake to pay any orders for the purchase of the Selkirk estate. But here is the absurd statement of the *Islander*; let the intelligent reader furnish his own comments.

"THE LOAN BILL.—As the British Government was virtually pledged to sanction this measure, the Royal assent was to be expected, and accordingly it has been received. It is also stated that Governor Daly and his Councilors will not be trusted with the money but that the Earl of Selkirk will be paid by an order on the Imperial Treasury. If this report be true, the precaution is good; but an independent Assembly has yet to enquire why Imperial debts should be saddled on the people of this Colony. If compensation be due to the Proprietors, it is clearly owing by those who maintained them in possession by the strong hand, contrary to law."

CASCUMPEC SORREE.—According to previous announcement a Sorree was held in Cascumpec, on the 29th ult. The attendance was large and respectable. Several from a considerable distance honored us with their presence. The hour for Tea having arrived, the seats were soon occupied around the various tables, which were abundantly and sumptuously furnished; and those who presided were kept busy for a length of time, at successive tables, to entertain parties who were still arriving. The tables having been removed, and the company in various groups having enjoyed themselves—some in strolling around those beautiful grounds in the immediate vicinity of the new Church, (to aid in finishing which the proceeds of the Sorree was to be appropriated,) others in enjoying that a greasable conversation which such scenes are so well adapted to draw forth. It was at length moved that Mr. H. Bell take the chair, who, upon doing so, made a few suitable remarks, as to the object in view in the proceedings of the day, and intimated that there were still a few cakes (the gift of some benevolent ladies) to be offered for sale, which being disposed of, realized the very handsome sum of £6 15s. Now followed the intellectual part of the treat: eloquent addresses and sweet music—the soul-stirring enchantment of sacred song—alternately. The meeting was addressed by the Rev. Mr. McLeod, of St. Eleanor's, the Rev. Mr. Fraser, Pastor of the Congregation, Mr. T. Fairbairn, of Tignish, Mr. MacEachen, and Mr. Geo. W. Howlan, of Cascumpec. Robert Gordon, Esq., was called upon, but, on account of the lateness of the hour, made but a few remarks. The various speeches delivered were listened to with the deepest interest. The national anthem having been sung, the company dispersed, all seemingly much pleased with the varied and combined enjoyments of the day. The sum realized amounted to about £29. The Presbyterian congregation of Cascumpec feel extremely grateful for the sympathy shown them on various occasions, since the loss of their Church last fall by fire, and are happy to intimate that the new building is rapidly progressing, and is expected to be completely finished in November next. The work, so far, certainly reflects great credit on the mechanical skill of the superintendent, Mr. James Carroll, who has been employed by the contractor, Mr. William Bell, to oversee the work.—Com.

On Saturday, the 15th instant, a dead body was picked up about one mile off the Nail Pond Shore, by some of the fishermen of that place. The body, having been brought ashore, was examined by William Hubbard and Stanislaus F. Perry, Esquires, in the presence of a good many who had assembled there. The deceased was a person of about five feet eight inches—wore a striped shirt and a red flannel shirt over it—a suit of oil-cloth and a pair of grey homespun trousers underneath, and a pair of Jersey fishing boots; the flesh was completely off his hands and feet. Supposed to be a fisherman from the Bay Chaleur, who perished by the recent disastrous storm. The body was decently buried at Tignish, on Sunday morning.—Com.
