Steel Outlook Seen Brighter For Investors

CLEVELAND (AP) — Financial advisers again are advising investors to buy steel stocks, a sign that the industry has picked itself up from a lagging research program four years ago, the editor of Steel says.

Walter J. Campbell, editor of the metalworking weekly, writes that "four years ago the industry's research appeared to be lagging, its market sagging. Friends of the industry were shaking their heads and bankers were advising investors not to buy steel stocks."

New, more efficient production technologies have been embraced since then, says Campbell. "Research is being given the big push. Marketing is being revolutionized. All activities are being co-ordinated toward a specific opportunity—to increase the profitable market for steel."

Steel consumption continues to be high, the magazine also says. In this week's issue the U.S. commerce department figures show that manufacturers used 12 per cent more steel in the first four months of this year than they did in a similar period during 1963.

WILL DECLINE

This week's production will about equal the 2,450,000 tons poured last week, Steel estimates. The magazine says, steelmaking operations will go into a seasonal decline toward the end of June.

Production this month will probably be about 10,400,000 tons compared with 11,900,000 tons in May, the magazine says. July's output may drop to 9,300,000 tons when automakers begin their model changeovers and the vacation season gets into full swing, it added.

Steel's price continued to No. 1 heavy melting scrap fell 17 cents last week to \$32.33 a gross ton.

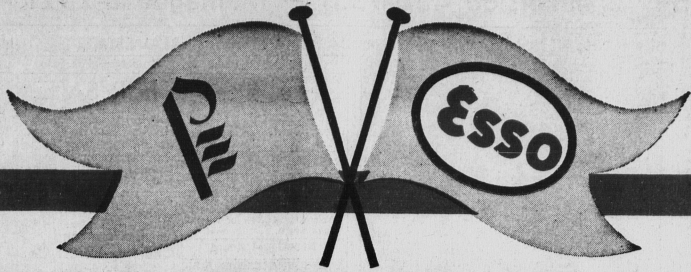

RURAL POLICE FORCE

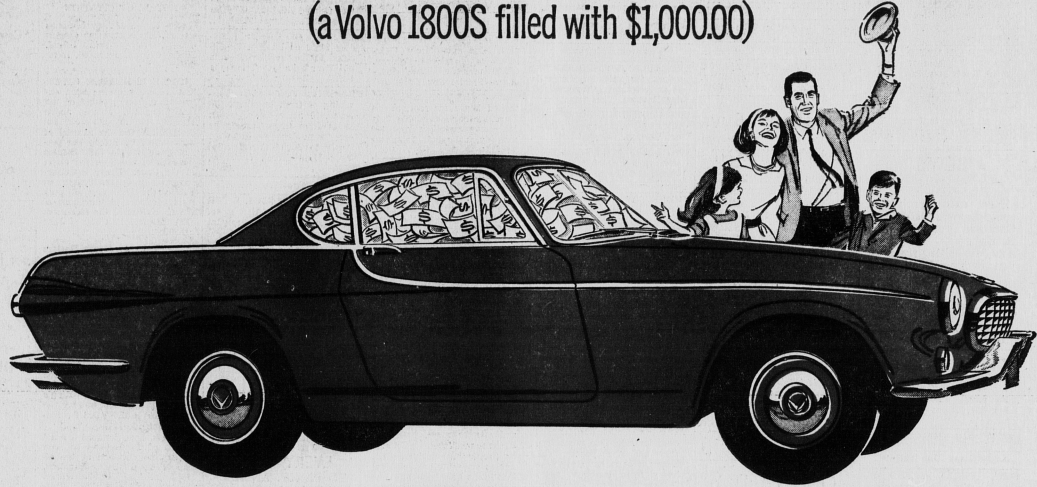
