AT THE DRIVING PARK.

Result of the Races To-day.

The track was in excellent condition, and a large number of spectators occupied the grand stand. At one o'clock the 3-minute class was called.

THREE-MINUTE CLASS.

First Heat—The entries in this class were: Boline, owned by E. L. Hoff, St. John, N. B.; Egmont, owned by D. A. McNally, Alberton; Charlotte, owned by J. M. McLeod, Charlottetown; Maud M., owned by A. L. Slipp, Truro; Deceiver, owned by J. J. Dean, St. John, N. B.; and Peerless, owned by J. McLeod, Summerside. Peerless and Egmont were drawn. Natalie Cuyler obtained the pole. Boline second, Deceiver third, Maud M. fourth. The horses got away well on the fourth score. Deceiver quickly drew ahead, closely followed by Maud M., with Natalie Cuyler a good third at the half. Maud M. was next with Deceiver, but at the three-quarter pole she broke and lost some ground. She trotted gamely the rest of the heat, but failed to gain much upon the Arch. Deceiver who won the heat in 2:30. Boline was distanced.

Second Heat—The horses got away after scoring four times. The struggle was between Deceiver and Maud M., the former taking the lead from the start, but being closely pressed all the way by the mare. All three horses trotted beautifully from start to finish, the result being the same as in the first heat. Time, 2:30.

Third Heat—The entries were: Maud M., this race was the prettiest and most exciting ever seen in Charlottetown. The horses got a good start, Natalie Cuyler being slightly in the rear. The two first trotted squarely and beautifully, being neck and neck the first half, but after the third turn, Deceiver obtained a slight advantage, which the mare almost overcame on the homestretch. Deceiver won the heat by a head and captured first money, Maud M. second, and Natalie Cuyler third. Time 2:32.

TWO-YEAR-OLD CLASS.

First Heat—The entries were: Bean Prince, J. E. Arsenault, Wellington; Predict, by Alder Black, Searstown; Hatanu, by Milford Farm, Charlottetown; Edith L., by A. N. Large, Charlottetown; Willow Side Belle, by J. R. Lamy, Amherst; Lucy Lee, by John Canning, Hope River; and Brighton Boy, by Barret Henderson, North River. Bean Prince, Predict and Willow Side Belle were drawn. The four remaining horses, however, made up a very pretty class, and was greatly admired by the thousands in attendance. Edith L. had the pole. The horses got a bad start on the seventh score, Hatanu having broken, but by the skill of her driver she soon obtained second place and drew to the front. She had a good lead at the half, Edith L. being second and Brighton Boy third. In the greater part of the last half the horses were in procession, but on the last quarter Brighton Boy made a fine start and drove up close to Edith L., pushing her hard for second position. Lucy Lee was distanced. Hatanu was given third place for breaking at the judges gave Brighton Boy second position and Edith L. first. Time 2:50.

Second Heat—The horses got away on the third score. Hatanu quickly drew to the front and Edith L. had second place; but at the quarter pole she was passed by Brighton Boy who was again passed by Edith L. On the first score, after the half, Brighton Boy again captured second place, which he held till the finish. Edith L. was distanced. Hatanu won the heat in 2:41.

Third Heat—This heat was won by Hatanu in 2:41. Brighton Boy acted badly and was distanced.

STALLION RACE.

First Heat—The entries in this class were: Promoter, owned by W. S. McKie, Charlottetown; Golden Boy, A. N. Large, Charlottetown; Harry C., by H. C. Connolly, Charlottetown; Brazilian, by J. C. Mahon, Truro; and Almost Wilkes, by H. C. Connolly, St. John's. All the horses started. Golden Boy had the pole, with Almost Wilkes second, Promoter third, Harry C. fourth, and Brazilian fifth. They got away on the eighth score. Brazilian took the lead but broke at the first quarter and was passed by Golden. The contest between these two was most exciting throughout. Golden trotted gamely and maintained his lead, Brazilian being a length behind at the finish. Harry C. obtained third place, Promoter fourth, and Almost Wilkes fifth. Time 2:29.

Second Heat—The horses got a good start on the third score, Golden in the lead. Promoter forged to the second place and pushed Golden hard throughout the race. Harry C. put on a great spurt on the home stretch. At the finish there was about a head between each of the three horses—Golden first, Promoter second and Harry C. third. The heat was again gained by Golden. Golden was most exciting from start to finish. Promoter was however given first place by the judges, Golden second, Harry C. third, Almost Wilkes fourth and Brazilian fifth. Time 2:31. At the conclusion of this heat the owner of Brazilian withdrew his horse.

Third Heat—In this heat Almost Wilkes took second place, and for the first half passed Promoter very closely. At the three-quarter pole Harry C. drew ahead of Almost Wilkes, and Golden took the third place. The heat was finished in this order: Promoter first, Harry C. second by a neck, Golden third and Almost Wilkes fourth. The horses were all hunched at the in. The judges gave Golden second place. Harry C. third. Time, 2:32. The race was postponed till tomorrow at 11 o'clock sharp.

An evident improvement was easily seen in the large, plain figures on the blackboard on which the results were announced to the crowd.

Cholera in Persia.

Calcutta, Sept. 27. Advice received here from Persia show that for two weeks past cholera has been ravaging the towns and villages along the eastern shore of the Persian Gulf. Several villages have been completely deserted, and the inhabitants having fled into the interior to escape the dreaded scourge that worked such havoc last year in that locality. It is believed that these fugitives have carried cholera germs with them, and that their flight will result in a wide dissemination of the disease. At Kazeroon, in the province of Farsand, a considerable distance inland from the Gulf, there are many deaths from cholera daily.

The Health of Prince Bismark.

Berlin, Sept. 26. Von Alben, an artist who is a close friend of the Bismark family, arrived here from Kissingen this evening. He gives an unexpectedly discouraging report of the Prince's condition. The most formidable of Bismark's maladies, he says, has been acute pneumonia. The disease was not discovered by the physicians until Bismark's condition had become critical. He is quite weak and quite liable to fatal relapse.

St. John, Sept. 27. George M. Downing, of West Chester parish has been appointed to the chair of physics in the University of New Brunswick. He is a B. A. of the University of Pennsylvania, and holds the degree of Electrical Engineer from the Polytechnic Institute, Brooklyn.

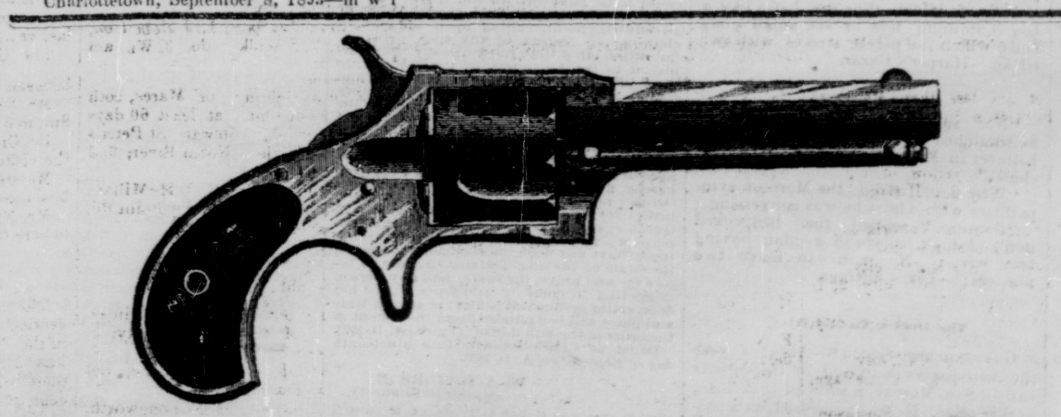
