THE Montreal Bank has declared a dividend of 5 per cent. This disposes of the rumors that there would be added a 2 per cent. bonus. It is stated on the street that the earnings of the bank for the half-year were about 5 1/2 per cent. or the same as last year, but the management decline to say anything at present.

A MONSTER radical demonstration in favor of the abolition of the House of Lords, was held in Hyde Park, London, on Sunday. Over 100,000 persons were present. Resolutions were passed, declaring that the House of Lords is needless and dangerous and ought to be abolished. No speeches were made by members of the House of Commons.

THE failure of Bowman, of San Francisco, is one of the most extraordinary that ever occurred on the Pacific Coast. He was the confidential agent of persons whose wealth aggregated \$150,000,000. He transacted all their business in his own name, and they drew on him as their necessities required. His liabilities are about \$770,000 and assets \$553,000.

"GROG BOATS" are sent among the British fishermen off the coasts of York and Cleveland by enterprising Hollanders. These boats are fitted out like English barrooms, with all the modern improvements, including barmaids, so that the sailors and fishermen can go on long sprees without the trouble of going ashore. These grog boats are a nuisance. They are demoralizing the toilers of the sea.

THE annual convention of the National Drug Association assembled at St. Louis on the 22nd inst., with over two hundred delegates. President Gallatly, of New York, presided. He stated that there was a delegation from the National Retail Drug Association and a delegation from Canada present, so that before long there would be a National and International Drug Association. He said national legislation was wanted by the drug trade, which he hoped would be secured.

OFFICERS MACLAREN and Bonness have been making it rather lively of late for Nova Scotia smugglers, says the St. John Globe. A Novel Shipment of Oysters.

A Moncton Times correspondent writes from Point du Chene under date of Oct. 24:

A barrel of oysters was forwarded from here to-day to Hamburg, Prussia, via New York, with the following card:

From the Inspector of Fisheries for Province of P. E. Island, Canada:

This barrel Canadian oysters is sent as a test whether they can be shipped and arrive at a German port alive and in good condition for breeding and for food.

It not immediately claimed on arrival of steamship at Hamburg, will the agent of the Line please open the barrel and test if they are alive and sound—if spoiled destroy them, but if alive and in good condition forward at once to Herr Von Bunsen,

or to the Hon. Commission for Scientific Exploration of the German seas, Berlin.

Another "Successful Islander."

The Elk Mountain Pilot of Crested Butte, Colorado, reports that one M. A. McLeod skipped out last Saturday with all the money he could collect and forgot to pay his bills. This is the worst case of misplaced confidence we have heard of lately. It seems he had a contract on the Cascade Mountain Mining Company's mines, and he also had a contract to deliver so many cords of wood to the Sylvanite Mine. He came to town on Friday and drew about \$800 from each company, which he was entitled to, for the purpose of paying the men in his employ. On Saturday morning search was made for him but he could not be found. The \$1,600 and himself had both left the town, leaving the men that had been to work for him all summer without a dollar. Some of the men he owed from \$50 to \$150, and the wrath of vengeance would have been visited upon Mr. McLeod if they had caught him. Every means was taken to intercept him in his flight, but as yet he has not been caught. The men have the sympathy of the public, as they are all poor, hard working men, and the severest punishment would be too good for this miscreant should he be caught. Sir Moses Montefiore.

LONDON, Oct. 27. Special services were held at Rainsgate to-day in honor of the centenary of Sir Moses Montefiore. The latter was present, and at the conclusion of the services said: "I cannot tell a thousandth or a ten thousandth part of what I feel to-day, when, by the blessing of the Almighty, I have arrived at so full an age. I thank Him for His merciful providence, and thank all my friends for their great kindness." A reception was subsequently held.

The Scott Act.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27. The Supreme Court meets to-morrow, when the knotty point rising out of the Scott Act contest, will be argued. The question involved in the Kent case is whether signatures once attached can be withdrawn, and in the Perth case, whether the petition must be filed in one registrar's office, or both, where there are two. There were two registrars, one for East Riding, in Perth, and the petition was only filed in one.

The Maamtrasna Murders.

LONDON, Oct. 27. In the Commons, to-day, Parnell said he believed that in case the Government would direct an inquiry into the Maamtrasna murder case, the Irish party would be able to prove the innocence of four of the persons convicted. He contended that the Government made no attempt to meet the case as represented by the Irish party. Sir Wm. Harcourt said that nine of the men accused had admitted their guilt.

A Serious Railway Accident.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 28. By a collision on the Nebraska Road to-day, a car containing 44 Italians, were thrown down an embankment. Fourteen were seriously injured, but it is thought none fatally.

The Canadian Voyageurs.

CAIRO, Oct. 24. Three hundred and fifty Canadian voyageurs have arrived at Wady Halfa, and are hauling boats up the rapids. Advice from Sebbah report the town in a healthier condition, small pox having died out.

The Irish Vote on the Franchise.

LONDON, Oct. 27. The Irish party has decided to withhold their vote on the Franchise Bill. This will reduce the Government majority to 85.

A Mining Disaster.

PITTSBURG, PA., Oct. 27. A mine disaster occurred here this afternoon. Two men were killed and several injured.

Cholera Extinct.

ROME, Oct. 27. Cholera is now regarded as practically extinct in Italy.
