A SPELLING BEE - The eighty-five (see here) in the public schools of Lockport, N. Y., had a spelling contest the other day, to the great delight of their pupils, because some of the teachers did not altogether cover themselves with glory. Of the eighty-five, only five spelled "Rensselaer" correctly, and seventy-four per cent. of the whole number misspelled "acknowledgment." All of the following words were wrongly spelled by more than half of the teachers, and several of them by more than fifty: "Supersede," "resuscitative," "excellence," "beneficial," "business," "medal," "maintenance," "milliner," "pretentious," "gaseous" and "onocle." The word "Genesee" is said to have caught a good many victims. The old-fashioned spelling school should be revived in that section.
LOVE at FIRST SIGHT - A servant girl who recently arrived in Portland, Me., from her home in Newfoundland, relates a remarkable incident in which she figured as a bridesmaid. There were four other young girls besides herself in the second class cabin of the steamer from St. John's to Halifax. During the last two hours before the arrival in the latter city a man from the first cabin, about 50 years of age, made acquaintance with one of the girls who was but 18. It was a case of love at first sight. He accompanied the five girls to their boarding house, and the next day the couple were married and departed for the groom's home in Seattle, Wash. He claimed to be worth \$20,000. The affair was not a pre-arranged elopement, for the bridesmaid above mentioned knew positively that they had never seen each other before that last day on the steamer. The bride was starting out to seek her fortune as a servant, with her companions, while the man was on a business trip.
STAMBOUL NOT KING. - According to a recent despatch from Chicago, Stamboul's performance of 207 1/2, made on the Stockton, Cal., track November 23, last, a mile that crowned him king of trotting stallions, has been rejected by the American Trotting Register Association. Kromelin, who covered a mile at Nashville, Tenn., in 2:07 1/2, on November 12, according to the register is the acknowledged trotting king. The whole point at issue was whether Stamboul had made his famous tin cup record during the hours prescribed by the rules. It will be remembered that when the horse was sold at auction recently in Chicago, Auctioneer Kellogg made every effort to have the record substantiated, but failed, and consequently the famous stallion scarcely brought half his value. The decision is bound to have an important bearing on other records, and may lead to some leading trotting men suggest to the abolition of the plan of sending horses for records on private tracks. It is probable that the whole affair, however, will be brought into the courts.
