air. There were one or two 'patches' and silvers but most of them were reds.

With so many foxes prowling the countryside both night and day, it's a wonder we have any game left. For rabbits, huns and pheasants eternal vigilance assures longer life. Death also strikes from the air in the form of a Great Horned Owl, Snowy Owl or Goshawk. Our Huns appeared to be in danger of being decimated if the winter weather had continued rather than the pheasants.

At that we do not want to be too complacent in respect to the Ring-necks. We do not know how long pheasants can subsist on buds without grit. Nor have we any definite information on how long pheasants can withstand a protracted period of inclement winter weather on a diet of buds alone.

Grit is a very necessary food supplement in the winter months. Huns appear to require more than pheasants and Friday's blizzard drove them out of hiding and sent them scurrying to our snow-ploughed highways in search of gravel and sand. Motorists saw more Hun covens on the highway in one trip since the blizzard than they spotted all season.

Game census returns being mailed in to the Department concerned indicate that the kill on pheasants this past season will run into a high figure. Returns are incomplete at time of writing but the figures received to date assures a total running into the thousands.

Urban hunters run the risk of having their license privilege cancelled in 1952 if they fail to comply with the instructions on rural gun being license exempt, are not required to submit returns in respect to game shot or trout caught.

By a strange coincidence the men who were instrumental in stocking the province with Huns and pheasants at their own expense stand to be penalized if they do not comply with the provisions of the Game Act. On the other hand rural hunters are benefitting greatly by the money put up by their city cousins. They can shoot introduced upland game birds and catch trout in the dams that urban money built without the bother of filling in returns or contributing to the general wildlife pot.

Encouraging reports are coming in on how well the four major dams constructed by the Department of Industry and Natural Resources last season, with money derived from the sale of the combined Angling and Hunting licenses are standing up. Everyone living in the province benefits from those dams.

The hunter, angler, trapper and farmer, whether he hunts or fishes or just farms. Better crops result from the conservation of moisture and the number of dams that can be built before the judge of the Juvenile Court.

This hearing is the second one in a case in which it is alleged that two persons were observed entering a private garage late at night. The owner of the garage alleges that he confronted the two accused while they were attempting to steal tools, etc., from his car or garage. It is alleged that the youth who appeared yesterday escaped from the garage after making threatening motions toward the plaintiff, with a hammer he held. The second lad, who was caught by the plaintiff, appeared on Thursday, and was remanded for sentence in Police Court this morning.

Watson MacNaught, M.P., parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, cut the ribbon across the main door of the new federal building in Summerside and thereby officially opened the structure to the public. The ceremony was performed in the presence of a large number of invited guests which included members of the clergy, members of the provincial legislature, heads of the different government departments which are housed in the building and citizens of the town.

Before performing these pleasant duties, however, I feel that I should say a few brief words. In the first place I wish to express my heartfelt congratulations to the firm of M. F. Schurman Co.
