The minimum fine and costs was imposed on a resident of Southern King's, for a violation of the Highway Traffic Act.

The adjourned March sitting of the County Court, Fifth Circuit of King's County, was held in the Court House at Georgetown on Tuesday, May 15th at 11.00 a. m., with Judge J. S. DesRoches presiding. The first case, for damages to a motor vehicle, in which an interlocutory judgment had been previously given, with damages to be proven, was adjourned to a date satisfactory to the parties, to prove damages in Chambers. The second case was "for money due on contract" and judgment of non-suit was given against the plaintiff. The third case involved an action "for conversion and wrongful taking", was adjourned at the request of the attorney of a Charlottetown financial house, with which the plaintiff is in bankruptcy. Five cases of arrears in school taxes were adjourned to a date to be fixed, to enable the school secretary to try and contact the defaulting parties by registered letter. The Court was adjourned sine die.

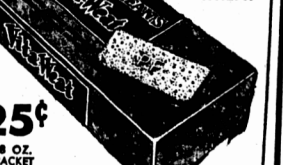
