STONE CONSULATE

JAKARTA (CP)—About 7,000 youthful Indonesians stoned the U.S. consulate Saturday at Surabaya, and invaded its grounds, an American embassy spokesman here reported.

This is the second attack on an American consulate by an Indonesian mob in nine days. On July 30, Indonesian youth demonstrators stoned the American consulate at Medan, Sumatra.

In the case of a direct loan from CMHC, construction must be started within 45 days. If construction is not started within the 90-day period, application may be made to the approved lender for an extension of time.

This extension must not exceed 60 days and the borrower must apply within 30 days after the expiry date of the 90-day period.

THE NATIONAL HOUSING ACT provides for loans by approved lenders. These are private companies such as chartered banks, life insurance companies and trust and loan companies authorized by the federal government to lend under the terms of the Act.

A list of the approved lenders is available from any office of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. If approved lenders are not making loans in the area in which you wish to build, you may then apply directly to CMHC for a loan. In this case federal government funds are used for the loan.

Before CMHC can consider making a direct loan, you must provide written evidence that you have tried to obtain an NHA loan from at least two private lending companies.

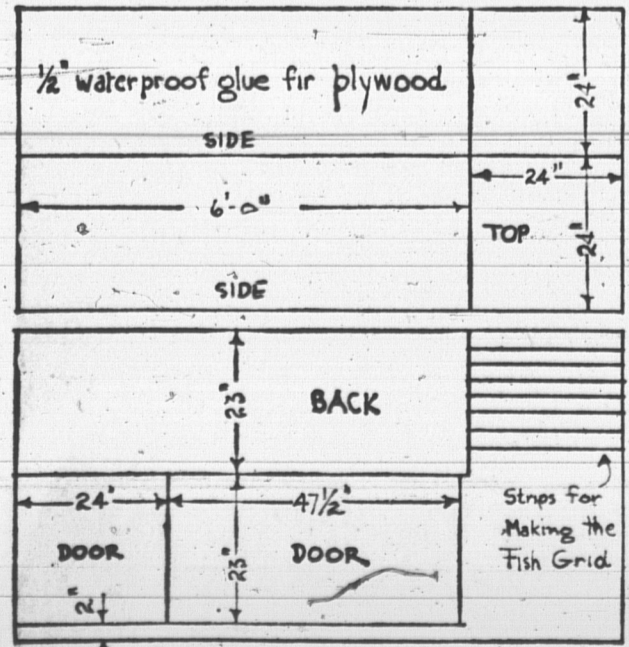
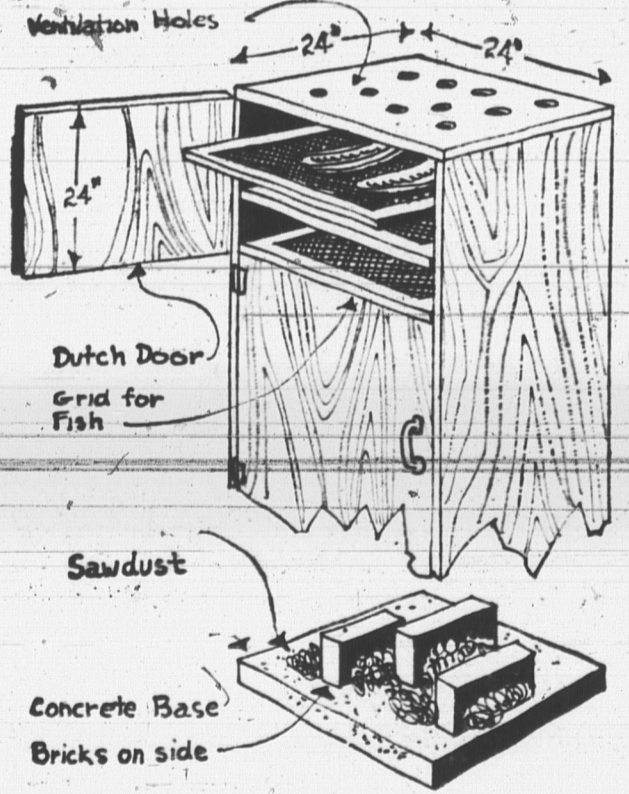
In smaller centers and rural areas, where lending by the private companies may be limited, such evidence is required from only one company.

Under NHA arrangements, your monthly payment to the approved lender includes an amount equal to one-twelfth the estimated annual taxes on your home.

When you receive your tax bill from the municipality you forward it to your lender for payment. Some lenders arrange with the municipality to have tax bills sent direct to them for payment and then mail the receipted bill to the home owner. This method of tax payment relieves you from having to make a lump sum payment for taxes.

While your tax instalments are being held by the lender, you will receive interest on these amounts. The monthly amounts collected are based on an estimate of your taxes for the year ahead.

Where taxes prove to be higher or lower than the estimated amount, the lender will adjust the tax portion of your monthly payment accordingly.



PLYWOOD FISH SMOKER

Fresh caught fish, slowly smoked for several hours in the smoke of a wood fire, are transformed from a simple dish into a rare delicacy. The drawings are self-explanatory and even do-it-yourselfers with a minimum of skill can make a smoker of waterproof glue fir plywood which will last for years. All the parts can be cut from two 4'x8' sheets of fir plywood 1/2" thick. Framework is unnecessary—gluing and nailing are sufficient. Wood frames with chicken wire stretched across them support the fish in the upper section. The concrete slab base is provided for the fire. Fine sawdust, wood shavings, small branches or even fir

cones produce a satisfactory smoke. After the first is burning dampen it well with sawdust and regulate the draft to produce a slow steady smoke. Shavings of oak, alder, hickory, beech or apple give delicious flavour to the fish. But pine, cedar and woods containing resins will not give good results. To prepare the fish for smoking, open nad gut them and remove the heads. Soak in a salt solution—four cups of pure salt, without iodine, in a gallon of water. Various combinations of volume of smoke, kind of fuel and temperature will produce a wide variety of flavours and textures—experiment to get the smoked fish flavour you like best.

Commissioner Defends Plans For Special Detention Units

OTTAWA (CP)—Allan J. MacLeod, commissioner of penitentiaries, has defended plans to build four special detention units for Canada's toughest prisoners.

He said years of trying to segregate dangerous prisoners in prisons like St. Vincent de Paul has never produced anything workable and separate institutions are considered the only answer.

The planned units, first of which should be opened by next summer at St. Vincent de Paul, Que., have been criticized by the Canadian Corrections Association and the John Howard Society of Quebec in the last few months.

Guy Favreau said he was considering delaying the program until a parliamentary committee could study the situation, and his successor as justice minister, Lucien Cardin, also is considering the problem.

Man Dies Under Tractor

SUMMERSIDE — An Irish-born man, Lawrence Irving Campbell, 51, was fatally injured at his home late Friday night when the tractor he was driving turned over in his farmyard.
