MRS. JOHN O. GORDON

—On Tuesday afternoon, November 7th, 1950 death claimed a well-known and highly respected resident of Alma in the person of Mrs. John O. Gordon. She had been ill for three weeks but was thought to be nearing recovery when, with unexpected suddenness, she passed away.

Grace Riley was born at Malpeque in January, 1889, but when a young girl, came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Riley to live in Alma. On October 17th, 1889 she was married to John Owen Gordon of Montrose. Part of their married life was spent in South Kildare and the remainder at Alma.

Besides her husband Mrs. Gordon is survived by six daughters and two sons: Mrs. William Horne (Mary) of Elmisdale, David of Alma, Mrs. Brenton Ramsay (Hazel) of South Kildare, James of Alma, Mrs. Wilfred Gillis (Lilla) of Moncton, Mrs. Fred Gillis, (Jean), of Moncton, Mrs. Marshall Rayner (Dorothy) of Greenmount, and Ethel at home. She is also survived by two brothers, George and John Riley of Haverhill, Mass., by thirty-nine grandchildren and thirty great grandchildren.

For many years she taught in Montrose Sunday School and for six winters in recent years the children of Alma met at her home for Sunday School. The mission work of the church held a large place in her life. For seventeen years she was president of Alma W. M. S. Auxiliary and for six years was leader of Alma Mission band. She will be greatly missed by a large number of friends and neighbors to whom her kindness and gracious hospitality were well-known, but most deeply by her family to whom she was a devoted and loving wife and mother.
