Although the authorities in the Soviet Zone attempted to minimize the people's uprising of June 17 with every means of Bolshevik dialectic in the days immediately following, they have now swung completely over to persecuting the real or alleged participants with every terroristic measure at their disposal.

East German Uprising

These figures do not include sentences passed by Soviet military courts. Apart from the summary shooting of the West Berliner Willy Götting on June 18, who was charged by the Soviet tribunal, for no reason whatsoever, of "provocation on behalf of a foreign intelligence service," not a single court martial sentence has been announced of the many carried out by the Russians.

According to an internal report of the Soviet Zone Ministry of the Interior, 1,300 such victims of Soviet military justice have already been reported to the Soviet Union, added to 3,000 people sentenced even before the 17th of June.
