Irish Moss Is Plentiful

ALBERTON — A sizeable boom was experienced in the Irish Moss industry in Western Prince County in the past few days. From Rustico around North Cape to Cape Wolfe, moss was reported coming ashore in huge quantities.

A Rustico man was reported to have harvested 500 worth of moss and several other families approach the \$1,000 dollar mark Friday.

At Waterford, moss buyer James Shea said Saturday was the busiest day he ever with trucks arriving with moss from all over the county. A 30,000 pound truckload was dispatched to Maine on Friday and two others are to be loaded Monday.

Operations are a month ahead of last year. Mr. Shea stated and it is not unusual to have a good harvest of moss when the ice leaves the shores.
