Two Mile Trot Goes Tonight

The secret for keeping the attendance and betting up at a racetrack is — give the fans good racing — and that's what Summerside Raceway is doing.

Tonight something different is on tap — a two mile trot, with 12 horses at the maximum allowed going the double distance for a purse of \$300, plus a trophy and blanket to the winner.

In a two mile trot, it is not the fastest horse that hits the wire first; but the horse that can keep on trotting. A trotter that can go a mile in 2:20 and then back it up with another in the same time will usually beat a trotter that goes the first mile in 2:10 and then runs out of gas in the second one.

The stable entry of Drillo Hal and Cyclone Kelly will likely be the early favorites — and Rollo-matic, Homestretch, Jimmy Galon and Calamity Boy will also be heavily backed. Gliding Billy will also have his backers, especially the ones that remember he won the last 2 mile trot held a couple of years ago. Then for those who like a lot for their money there's a field of no less than 5 horses — all on the one ticket — and anyone of them could be a winner.

The other feature on the program will bring a field of 7 pacers together and a winner will be hard to pick. Mountain Marie and Mr. McElwyn Key both "off" a mile in 2:09-4 — Kid Fright and Orchestra Leader's last miles were in 2:10; along with Billy Rice, Paddyland Girl and Mark Purdue, who are all capable of a mile better than 2:10. It should be the best race of the current season. The second double dash is itself a feature with 3 top trotters pitted against 4 pacers. Little A.T., Rio Grande and Singalong all capable of leaving as fast as any pacer, will be trying to head Irene Mir, Sunny Key, Tea Time Gal and Blue Mountain Girl into the first turn in the battle for positions.

One other double dash and a single — both with 8 starters — fill out what seems to be the best card of the year.

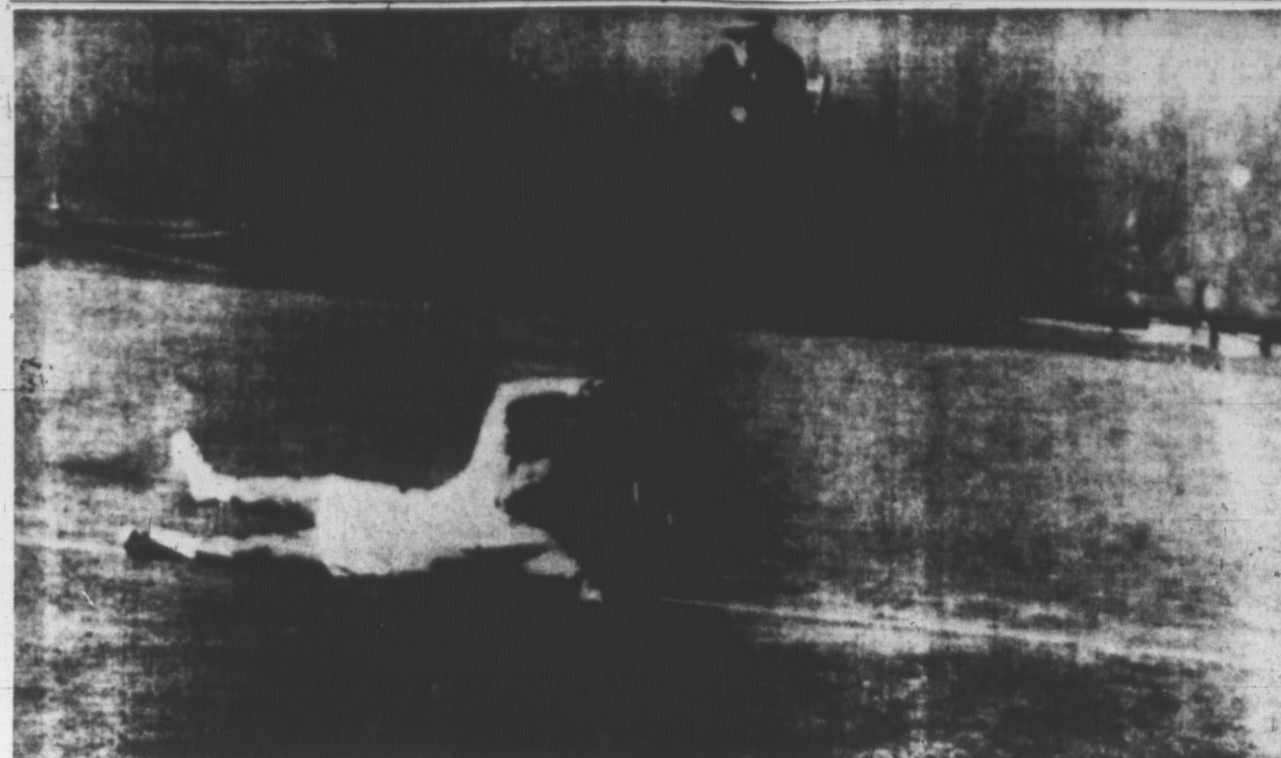

NEW YORK (AP) — Tony Oliva of Minnesota Twins, forced to carry a double load while trying to win his second straight American League batting title, has moved to within nine points of pace-setting Carl Yastrzemski.

Oliva, sophomore Cuban outfielder, collected 11 hits in 24 times at bat last week. The .458 pace enabled him to gain seven points to 318. Yastrzemski, ninth-place Boston Red Sox remained at .327 with 12 hits in 37 attempts. Oliva led the AL last year with a .323 average.

The pressure has been on Oliva because the Twins' star slugger, Harmon Killebrew, has been sidelined with a dislocated shoulder since Aug. 2. Most of the other Twins have been unproductive and Minnesota's first-place margin has been trimmed to 4 1/2 games, three less than a week ago.

Jockey Frank Barroby Sensational In 1st Season

By DOUG DULMAGE REGINA (CP) — Almost certain to emerge from this year's Western Canada Racing Association's season as top jockey is Frank Barroby, a hard-riding 111-pounder who once thought he'd grow too big to ride.

"I was 117 pounds when I started riding in Winnipeg at 16," says Barroby, currently the hottest jockey on the Prairie circuit. "But I didn't grow any more and now I have no weight troubles as long as I lay off the potatoes at the table."

Now 22 and newly married, the diminutive Barroby appears certain to break Sandy Shields' hold on the WCRA's top jockey honors.

He jumped into the lead with 17 winners at a week-long meet in Saskatoon, then added a phenomenal 22 winners in 10 days here. By Sept. 2 he had 119 winners compared with 89 for Shields.

This is Barroby's first full season on the circuit which takes in Calgary, Edmonton, Regina and Saskatoon.

"I've ridden it part-time for the last two years and did fairly well, but this year will be my best if I can keep up the pace," AIMS AT BIG RACES.

His hottest streak came two years ago when he rode 78 winners in 42 days of racing, a record that still stands, at Assiniboia Downs in Winnipeg.

He's had more than 200 winners in each of the last two years, but that was totalling all the races in Winnipeg, the WCRA circuit, at Playfair in Spokane and at Phoenix during the winter.

His biggest single-race victories so far have come on Doolin Point in the \$7,500 Gold Cup at Assiniboia Downs in 1964, on Canadian Zenith in the Winnipeg Futurity in 1963 and on Farmsfield in the 1964 Alberta Derby.

With this background behind him in six short years, Barroby looks forward to the future with some big hopes.

"I guess every hockey dreamer someday of riding in the Kentucky Derby. I'm no different. It's the biggest thing to shoot for in riding."

But he says a jockey would have to get some kind of a break to get a chance like that.

"If I could do real well on some of the big tracks—like in Phoenix or at Toronto—and get a shot at some of the big races there, then maybe the breaks would come."

"Next to the Kentucky Derby, I would like to ride in the Queen's Plate."

Barroby will take his first steps in that direction when the

Dennis Ralston Continues Drive

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP) — Dennis Ralston's drive to redeem his Davis Cup failures got another boost Tuesday when the moody No. 1 U.S. player from Bakersfield, Calif., erased teammate Frank Froehling III of Coral Gables, Fla., 7-5, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3 for a fourth round spot in the National tennis championship.

The victory placed the Californian in the round of 16 and his next opponent is Ron Holmberg, a native New Yorker once regarded as the most promising player to come along since Bill Tilden.

The tournament filled the round of 16 in both men's and women's divisions on a sultry, cloudy day that drew around 6,000 to the West Side Tennis Club.

Eighth-seeded Cliff Drysdale joined the fourth-seeded Ralston in the fourth round along with Charlie Pasarell, 21-year-old Puerto Rican who upset second-seeded Fred Stolle of Australia on Sunday.

Pasarell smashed Keith Jennings of New Canaan, Conn., 6-2, 6-3, 6-2, but was well below his top form.

Mays Wins MVP Award

CINCINNATI (AP) — Willie Mays became the first unanimous choice in the history of the National League most valuable player awards when all 50 writers and sportscasters on the selection panel cast their votes for him for August.

The 34-year-old outfielder kept Cincinnati Giants in the thick of the pennant race with 17 home runs for the month. He drove in 29 runs in 31 games and moved past Lou Gehrig into fifth place in the all-time standings by hitting his 494th career home run Aug. 29.

The closest that any player came to Mays' vote in the past 36 months awards was Billy Williams of Chicago Cubs, who got 41 of 50 ballots in May, 1964.

MEADOW COURT Sure Starter

LONDON (CP) — Trainer Paddy Prendergast says Meadow Court will "definitely" run in the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe in Paris, pitting the Irish-bred colt against Sea Bird II, the French horse that beat him by two lengths in the June 2 derby at Epsom, England.

Meanwhile, Meadow Court, owned jointly by Calgary publisher Max Bell, Vancouver oilman F. R. Crosby, continues to make shambles of the betting odds on today's \$42,431 (\$127,000 St. Leger, the last of the British racing classics. The chestnut colt's 2-to-5 odds make him the lowest-priced St. Leger favorite since 1917.

Prendergast said in an interview Monday night at Doncaster, Yorkshire, the site of the 189-year-old St. Leger, that Meadow Court will "definitely" take them all on in the Arc."

He said that he and jockey Lester Piggott are both confident of beating Sea Bird II. Officials at the Doncaster course announced Tuesday that Crosby will be unable to attend the St. Leger race because of illness.

In Hollywood, a spokesman for the singer said Bing developed a virus, but "it's nothing serious."
