

# 179 Blood Donors Yesterday At Clinic Held In Kensington

The spacious new Legion Home at Kensington was a beehive of activity last evening when a continuous line-up in which there were 179 blood donors, kept the clinic staff very busy between 7 and 9. However, as there were only 32 registered in the afternoon, on an objective of 100, the quota for the day was not reached. 52 of the donors were residents of Kensington and the remaining 127 were from all the surrounding districts. Members of the Kensington branch of the Canadian Legion, who sponsored this clinic and did everything possible to promote

and assist at it were ably supported by their Ladies' Auxiliary under the leadership of the President, Mrs. George Cotton. Nurses and High School Red Cross members, who also rendered valuable assistance, were secured by Mrs. Gordon Cooke. Last evening completed three days of clinics in Prince County with a total of 513 donors registered on a quota of 700. This makes it all the more imperative that donations reach its objective of 250 this afternoon and evening when clinics are being held in the Beaufort Club Hall.

## S'ide Lobster Carnival Begins With Big Parade

With the weatherman beaming his approval, the first annual Lobster Carnival in Summerside got under way yesterday afternoon with a huge parade which far exceeded the expectations of the enormous crowds which thronged the Main Street from the east end railway crossing to the corner of Water and Central Streets. Headed by the R.C.A.F. Band, under Sgt. W.F. Conkey, the parade moved off from the Canadian Legion Home at about 4.30. His Royal Highness King Neptune and his favorite Mermald, enthroned on a fire truck, were followed by the Legion Little Leaguers, proudly displaying their uniforms. Next in view came the Rotary float, complete with nurses and hospital bed and equipment and the Rotary sponsored school traffic patrols.

The Y Mens Little Leaguers, the Boy Scouts and the Y's Men's swimming instructors followed, jet propelled Ford car, a roller of ed in line. Next came the R.C.A.F. other days but still bravely chugging along in this modern age. The Air Cadet, the Kinsmen Little Leaguers, The Lions Club float were all intermingled with standard convertibles carrying the lovely Sea Queen contestants, who smiled graciously at the throngs and were in turn the recipients of the unanimous approval of the crowd.

The parade moved up Central Street to Notre Dame Street and thence to the civic stadium. OPENING CEREMONIES At 7.30 the official opening took place at the Stadium grounds in the presence of one of the largest crowds ever to congregate in the town. Backed by the members of the 17th Recce Regiment Band in their colorful uniforms, the various dignitaries and those who had taken part in the preparation of the carnival, assembled on the stand with Lieutenant Governor T.W.L. Farrow, who had taken part in the preparation of the carnival, acted as chairman and

introduced the various speakers. In officially opening the carnival Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, member of Parliament for Prince County, and parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, paid tribute to those who had worked so hard to bring it to a reality. He said he had been present at some of the committee meetings and was in a position to know how much hard work had gone into the carnival from its inception. "Carnival is the right word to describe this great project," he said, "so have fun, and let joy be unconfined."

The civic welcome to all present was extended by Mayor W.A. Currie who said that the carnival was the result of the desire of the citizens of the town to hold an outstanding event that would publicize the town and bring visitors back to Summerside again. He expressed the hope that the carnival would eventually attract out to become a full scale Prince County Exhibition.

Lt. Gov. Farrow extended his tribute to those who had made the carnival possible. Others who addressed the gathering included Lt. E. Baker, Maritime supervisor of Fisheries, and John Wright, president of the Summerside Board of Trade.

Within the stadium a constant flow of visitors came and went all during the evening. It was estimated that well over a thousand persons, as of the early part of the evening, had enjoyed the delicious lobster supper served by the Summerside Y's Menettes, and much larger number is anticipated to be in attendance each day as the show goes on.

Today's program will be highlighted by parades beginning at 2.45 and the long anticipated soap box derby and doll carriage parade will top the list.
