

IN MEMORIAM

MR. FRANK GALLANT

On Monday, July 12, there passed away at his home in Wellington, Mr. Frank Gallant in his 77th year.

The late Mr. Gallant was born in Urbainville, P. E. I., and as a young man, spent some years in the Western States, returning to take up farming in his native province.

In 1940, Mr. Gallant disposed of his large farm and moved, with his family, to the village of Wellington, where he continued to farm on a smaller scale, until illness forced him to discontinue his labors.

Everyone who had the pleasure of knowing the late Mr. Gallant knew him to be a strong politician, a keen lover of horses, and a man who was interested in all local affairs.

Expect Cut In Car Stocks

DETROIT, (AP)—Ward's automotive reports predicted Friday that from 150,000 to 200,000 cars are expected to be cut from new car field stocks by September-October changeover shut-downs.

This, the agency said, would reduce inventories to the lowest point since early last year.

Ward's said this week's U. S. output will consist of 98,243 cars and 17,678 trucks, lowest five-day volume of the year. Last week 1953 week output was 121,227 cars and 23,624 trucks.

Down this week for model changeover, Ward's said, were all Chrysler divisions and Studebaker, GM and Ford, it added, were reducing assemblies modestly.

Canadian assemblies this week are estimated at 2,025 cars and 422 trucks compared with 4,443
