Lieut.-General Sir Edward Bruce Hanley died suddenly at London on Saturday from heart disease. He was one of the British commission for the delimitation of Bulgaria in 1879 and for the Russo-Bulgarian frontier in Armenia in 1880. He commanded the second division of the forces employed in the Egyptian war in 1882. General Hanley was retired on July 30, 1890. He was a knight commander of the order of St. Michael and St. George and military knight commander of the Bath.
