

# Powers Will Stay Say Islanders; Red Hot Miners Here Tonight

There was good news out of the Islanders camp last night. Teddy Powers, smooth playing centreman will be playing against the Glace Bay Miners tonight and as far as coach Murph Chamberlain and the Islanders executive is concerned Powers is here to stay for the rest of the season.

But back of the good news concerning Powers there were a few shadows of gloom. These concerned the growing injury list in the Islanders ranks, of whom the latest member is right winger Gary Gordon. Gordon suffered a concussion when he was charged during the game in Halifax on Wednesday night.

Others who joined the injured list this week but who will play tonight are Hub Beaudry, Steve Brkaciach, and Larry Travis. Brkaciach has a broken bone in the back of his hand while Beaudry has an injured back and Travis is suffering from a charley horse.

Travis suffered his injury in the game against Sydney on Monday night and was under orders not to play against the Millionaires on Tuesday. However, he played and will be back in action against the last moving Miners tonight.

Big Steve and Beaudry were injured in Sydney on Tuesday. Both were doubtful starters for the Halifax game but both gave it the big try.

Meanwhile the red-hot Miners continue to push over all opposition in their late season drive. Last night they trounced the league-leading Halifax Atlantics 8-2 and the victory was their second over the Halifax Club this week.

The Miners, who were deep in the cellar during the early part of the season have come along so fast of late that they are only 13 points back of the Islanders.

But they can expect rough treatment from the Islanders tonight. Chamberlain stated last night that from here on in the Islanders are playing it rough and tough against both Halifax and Glace Bay so that both clubs will be softened up for the play-offs.

# Tigers Hope To Improve With Good Pitching

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—The best pitching in the American League will lift Detroit Tigers out of the cellar and boost the club into the first division this season, says manager Fred Hutchinson.

Fearless Freddie, who succeeded Red Rolfe last July, is convinced he has the nucleus of a club that should give the contenders a stiff battle within a year or two. He predicts a third or fourth-place finish this season.

Hutch is pleased with the club's numerous trades and purchases since last spring that brought new blood in first baseman Walter Dropo, shortstop Harvey Kuenn, second baseman Owen Friend, catcher J. W. Porter and outfielders Bob Nieman and Jake Crawford, but it is his conviction that it is the pitching that will carry the club.

"I honestly feel we have the best pitching in the league," Hutchinson said Thursday.

"We have six starting pitchers—Art Huttman, Ned Garver, Ted Gray, Hal Newhouser, Bill Wight and young Billy Hoelt. Huttman, in my opinion, has the brightest future of any pitcher in the league. He's got all the tools. Garver is recovered from his sore arm. Newhouser has assured me he is in the best shape he's been in in several years and has no pain in his left shoulder all winter. Hoelt will be a great pitcher some day. He's only 20 years old."

Detroit fell from second in 1950 to fifth in 1951 and last in 1952. Hutchinson pointed out, "I see no reason why we can't come back as fast. Put New York and Cleveland out of it and you'll find there is little difference among the six other clubs."

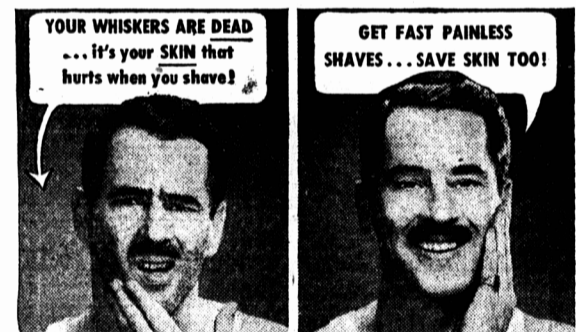
