Hopes Federal Offer Will Not Have To Be Repeated

OTTAWA (CP) — Labor Minister Starr hopes the new federal offer to pay half municipal payroll costs of special winter projects may never have to be repeated.

"If the government will do in future years will depend on what happens," he said in an interview Wednesday. "I sincerely hope that employment is such that the program will never have to be repeated."

"It is not being set up to provide any permanent pattern of federal aid."

"CRASH PROGRAM"

Meanwhile, Works Minister Green announced a "crash program" on construction of 60 post offices in small towns and cities across the country as a winter employment aid. Some work had already started in the \$1,500,000 project which may be extended in future years.

The municipal offer, first announced by Prime Minister Diefenbaker at Regina Monday, will cover municipal roads, other than arterial; streets, sidewalks, water and storm sewers and parks—but not buildings.

The view among officials here is that the federal government already is providing much aid on housing through the National Housing Act.

MUST MEET TESTS

To qualify for federal aid—that is, half the payroll costs—municipalities will have to meet certain tests to ensure projects undertaken to help provide work in addition to those which

Pollution Case Is Adjourned In Co. Magistrate's Court

A heavy docket of cases faced Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in County Magistrate's Court Wednesday morning.

Mr. Nicholson, following the cross examination, said before he proceeded any further in the case he wanted to clarify the question brought up by Mr. Bell.

GM Reports 3-Month Profit

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp. has reported a net profit of \$65,633,266 for this year's third quarter, compared with \$122,175,621 for the same period in 1957.

GM is the only one of the three big automakers to report a third quarter profit. Ford lost \$21,600,000 and Chrysler \$20,000,000.

General Motors' profits for the first nine months of 1958 were reported as \$399,147,515, down from \$608,412,329 in the same 1957 period. Both Ford and Chrysler reported nine-month losses this year.

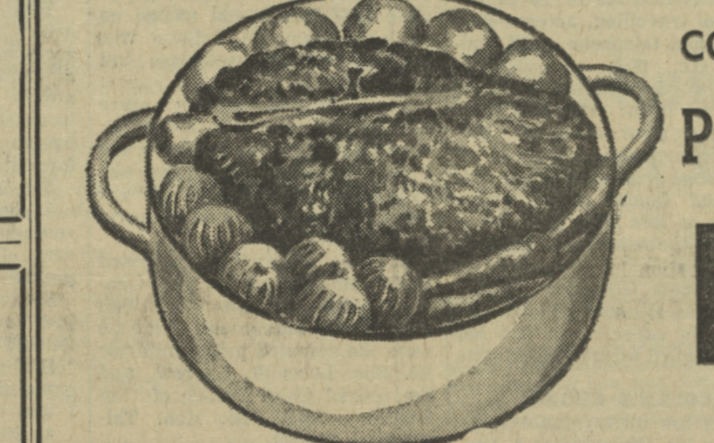
