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Fall Lobster Season Set To Close Wed.

TIGNISH — Wednesday will see the end of the lobster season on the west side of the Island. Catches which have been fairly poor during the early part of the season, showing good improvement during the last 10 days at Skippers Pond.

The total catch during the fall season is not as good as last year, but higher prices are expected to offset this problem. The lobstermen for canneries are trucked to the Tignish Fisheries Co-op factory at Jude's Point where a night shift is operating.

Market-sized lobsters are transported to Boston by transfer operated by Herb Pritham. In charge of operations at Skippers Pond during the fall season are Roy MacLeod, assistant manager of Tignish Fisheries Co-op; Franklyn Perry, Joseph Shea and Wilfred Doucette.
