**FAT CATTLE.**—A carload of fat cattle twenty in number, was shipped from Summerside to St. John a few days ago. Mr. C. Heffernan, of St. John, was the shipper.

**BURGLARS BIG HAUL.**—Burglars broke in to Huns Bank at Bracebridge Ont., a few nights ago and stole \$1000 in cash and \$9000 in bonds. They broke open the vault and wrecked the safe. They have not yet been apprehended.

**GRACE CHURCH.**—The Prince of Wales favourite hymn will be dealt with at the monthly hymnal Sermon Service in Grace Church to-morrow night. This will be the last of the services until the Pastors return from Conference. The choir will sing several times during the sermon.

**COMING THIS WEEK.**—The St. John Globe states that there is some talk of running the steamer City of Monticello between Chatham and Prince Edward Island. Something depends on whether subsidies can be secured from the Dominion as well as the two provincial governments.

**QUEEN'S JUBILEE CELEBRATION.**

Programme Arranged for the Day and Evening of June 22nd.

The Jubilee Committee met in the City Council Chamber last evening, Mayor Dawson presiding. Councillor Nicholson, chairman of the special committee appointed to prepare a draft programme submitted their report which was adopted after some amendments had been made. The programme provides as follows:  
Royal salute at 12 noon by No 1 Co., 4th Regiment Canadian Artillery.

Procession of military, firemen and fraternal societies to start from Queen Square at two o'clock. The route to be Queen Street to Water, Water Street to Prince, Prince to Kent, Kent to Victoria Park.

The children of the City schools will be massed on a grand stand to be erected on the northside of the cricket field on Victoria Park. After singing by the school children addresses will be delivered by Lieut.-Governor Howland and Mayor Dawson.

In the evening all provincial and city buildings will be illuminated. Citizens are requested to illuminate their houses on the occasion.

Torchlight procession by firemen. The cycling clubs are asked to participate.

Fireworks display at Victoria Park. A motion passed asking the Council to donate \$50 towards a fund for a regatta in the forenoon of the 22nd June, the money to be given a committee composed of Chas. J. Patton and Councillors Nicholson and Johnson.

The Committee have arranged for special fares by trains.  
Meeting adjourned sine die.

**CANADA AND THE STATES.**

Mr. Logan's Statement of Canadian Opinion

The toast, "The United States and Great Britain" was proposed by Hon. Clarence Darrow and responded to by H. J. Logan, M. P. for Cumberland, N. S., at Munday night's banquet at the Victoria Club of Chicago, to which a large number of Englishmen and Canadians belong.

Mr. Logan paid a high tribute to the members of the Club, who, while living under a foreign flag, were true to the home of their childhood. After referring at some length to the greatness of the British Empire, he spoke of the relations of the United States and Canada. "The feeling in Canada is today intensely British," said he. "If there ever was a desire for annexation in the heart of any Canadian, it is as dead today as Caesar's ghost. Not because we have any feeling of hatred towards your Great Republic, but because we are loyal to our Motherland. We are better as we are, and believe that there is a greater and grander future in store for us in a still closer commercial union of the Empire, of which we are proud to form a part. But," said he, "while we entertain these ideas of our political future, we desire to live in the friendliest relations with the United States. The policy of the Liberal party which is now in power at Ottawa, has been and is, better trade relations with this Great Republic. But we must have honorable and fair terms. That is our policy; but what do we meet? Since the Liberal party came into power, we have held out to leading statesmen at Washington the olive branch of commercial peace. The answer was the Dingley bill, and legislation which is irritating to our people. We desire to trade with our neighbors and cousins to the south, but we do not propose to kiss the hands that smites us. Let us hope that in the near future better counsels will prevail, and that statesmen of both countries may meet upon fair and honorable grounds and negotiate a treaty which will be beneficial."
