Concluding Sessions Of W.M.S. Presbyterial 27th Annual Meeting At S'side

Mrs. Hazen Howard of Cornwall, president of the P. E. I. Presbyterial of the W.M.S. of the United Church of Canada opened the second day of Presbyterial yesterday morning at Summerside. Members of the Lot 16 Auxiliary led the morning devotional exercises.

Mrs. Kenneth MacLean read the Scripture from 2nd Chronicles. This was followed by congregational singing of "O Word of God" and "Carnatic" prayer by Mrs. Clarence MacFadden and meditation by Mrs. Clarence Carr, the theme being "The Bible And The Nation". The leader stated the key to the solving of problems of human welfare may be found between the pages of the Bible, and that the law of God must ever be kept in the minds of citizens, and thus the Bible in the nation. The closing hymn was "Ocean Unto Ocean".

Miss Louise Callbeck of Bedouque, reporting for Christian citizenship stated that it was an obligation to the future citizens to abstain from indulgence in luxuries. She challenged Christians to action in the cause of citizenship, peace and temperance through agitation and education, and earnest prayer on the part of the church.

Spear Fishermen And Anglers To Stage Contest

SYDNEY, Jan. 21 - (Reuters) - Fifty Australian underwater spear fishermen and the same number of conventional anglers will meet in a "catch-as-catch-can" contest this week-end at Toowoomba Bay north of Sydney.

The two camps do not usually fraternize. Many rod-and-reel men are openly hostile to the invasion of the spearmen. One group of die-hard anglers, however, has issued the challenge to the underwater men in a bid to regain lost ground on the fishing front.

The spearmen took the "bait" eagerly. There are now about 25,000 of them around the Australian coast and they claim they are fast establishing their superiority over surface fishermen. The underwater men say that the big difference is that they take the initiative on the sea bed; the anglers leave it to the fish. They say they have to stalk fish as cunningly as men ever stalked game in the forests.

They wear dark woolen jerseys, trunks, socks and canvas shoes for warmth as well as camouflage. Often they wear heavy lead belts as well as flippers, masks and snorkel tubes for breathing. They are forbidden to spear fish from above the water. In the contest, which will be staged along 50 miles of coast and lake, the rod-and-reel fishermen will be permitted to count any catch of legal length or over. The spearmen will have to land fish 25 per cent above legal size. The anglers will fish day and night, but the spearmen will hunt only in daylight.
