Mr. Willard Murray is spending a short holiday at his home in York.

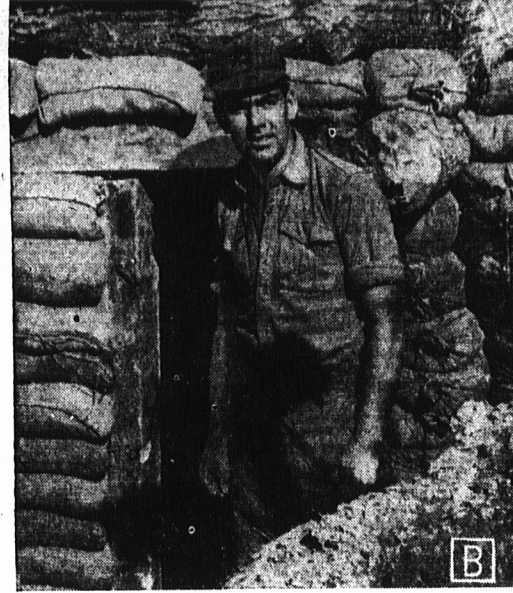

Hero Requests Return to Korea



BACK IN HIS DUGOUT in Korea is Lance-Corporal Bill Speakman, British hero awarded the Victoria Cross—equivalent of the Congressional Medal. Before and after being wounded, with complete disregard for his own safety, Speakman led six other men in repeated grenade charges, inflicting heavy losses on the Communists and allowing his wounded and greatly outnumbered comrades, including his officers, to withdraw to safety. He returned to Britain as a national hero, but, a fighting man of a fighting stock in Korea since the outset, he asked to return to the battle.

Sugar Ray Says Condition Good

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., June 18 — (AP)— Sugar Ray Robinson said he was in his best condition of the last two years yesterday as he did road work and punched the bag in a light drill for Monday's light heavyweight title match with champion Joey Maxim at Yankee Stadium.

Manager George Gainford rearranged Robinson's schedule to include boxing only on Wednesday and Friday in the final week.

"We're mapping our program to bring Ray into the ring at 158½ pounds, his perfect weight," said Gainford.

Greco To Defend Title Next Month

WINNIPEG, June 18 — (CP)— Closing prices of coarse grain showed a firmer trend today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange with gains spread across the board.

Upturns in U.S. grain markets were considered a factor in fairly active trading.

Commercial demand improved in oats and barley credited to export accounts. American shippers made good purchases of oats.

Flax brought buying by industrial interests and some American demand developed in rye.

Overnight loadings of Canadian wheat for export were: United Kingdom 3,350,000 bushels, Belgium 80,000, Italy 265,000, and Norway 60,000.

Queen of Sheba Wins Royal Hunt Cup At Ascot

ASCOT, England, June 18 — (AP)—Major Dermot MacAlmont, one of Britain's wealthiest race-horse owners, won the Royal Hunt Cup at Ascot for the second straight year today when his four-year-old filly, Queen of Sheba, streaked to a half-length victory.

A 100 to 7 shot, Queen of Sheba whipped a field of 28 other starters to earn a purse of nearly \$3,000 (\$8,400). Lord Durham's Brunetto was second with John Dewar's Aristophanes third by half a length.

Before the race, Queen Elizabeth, the Duke of Edinburgh and Princess Margaret rode along the track in state carriages.

The Queen had an entry in the first race, the 1 1/2-mile Ribblesdale Stakes, but it could not do better than third to Frenchman's Marcel Bousac's Esquilla a 9 to 2 favorite. The Queen's horse, Stream of Light, was 6 to 1 in the books.

Queen Elizabeth wore a black and white taffeta dress, with a full skirt, a black corded silk coat, a close-fitting ostrich feather hat, black gloves and black shoes. She carried a black handbag.
